WOULD-BE TRAIN WHICKERS.

Indictments Against Three, Bonds Fixed and Accused Taken to Jail.

The grand jury yesterday in Judge Miner's court found two indictments against each of the strikers arrested on the act of tearing up the Union Pacific track yesterday last. The first indictment charges them with an attempt to commit murder by blowing the rails of said U. P. track in such a way as to be unworkable by train men, for the purpose of obtaining the said track which was about to run over and under on which was a number of passengers. The other indictment charges them with tampering with and destroying property belonging to the Union Pacific Railway Co. An additional indictment was found against Deemey, in which he is charged with tearing and cutting the tracks of the Union Pacific Railway Co. on the morning of July 16.

Indictments were also found against the boys, Wooten, who accompanied the men to the scene of attempted work but who apparently took no part in the business and who also was supposed to keep watch and look out. He was found with arrested in one of the luggies belonging to the workmen.

The prisoners were without the necessary means with which to employ an attorney and J. D. Murphy was appointed by the court to act for them. The indictments were read to the workmen, who took and filed notice of them, apparently not realizing the seriousness of the case, after which they remained with Mr. Murphy and when asked, "guilty or not," all entered pleas of not guilty.

Their bonds were fixed on the first indictment at \$10,000 each and on the second at \$5,000 a head of \$100,000 each. Bonds were taken on the third indictment. They were unable to procure bondsmen and at 11:30 were started on the way to the penitentiary.

The time for trial will be set this afternoon and will probably be Monday morning as all are anxious to have the case disposed of.

Travel on the N. P.

Traffic on the Northern Pacific is gradually picking up. The first train from this place for Portland for fifteen days arrived here last night at 8:30. It was made up of four freight cars, two baggage cars, three day coaches, one sleeping car, one Pullman car. This train left San Francisco last Monday evening at 7 o'clock and has been hindered at night. There were about eighty-seven first-class passengers and several second class passengers, among them being some residents of Ogden city.

The R. G. W. also has Utah & Northern trains which should have here at 1:30 and 5:30 respectively, were held until the arrival of this train and a considerable amount of mail and express matter from the West was transferred to them to go north, south and east.

Lecturer Discharged.

On Monday the committee of the church met to consider the case of the lecturer who was arrested last Friday and held on bail to answer to a charge of inciting rioting, given in the United States for intentional torts, was argued by E. M. Allison for defendant and Attorney Magnus for prosecution.

Mr. Allison stated the offense was alleged to have been committed in New York, and argued that the committee of the synodical court had jurisdiction in the case, and asked for the immediate discharge of Letticher, that he might proceed on his way. The committee, after being argued for nearly two hours, was satisfied by the explanation and the defendant discharged.

Letticher and wife, Mrs. Letticher, could not take the next westbound train and arrived on their way to San Francisco, while Mrs. Letticher, the complainant, will remain in Ogden.

Tonight's Prize Fight.

Henry Ferguson underwent his last training yesterday before his fight with William, who is to take him to the ring, which will take place tonight. Monday last he was caught in a rapid race, bowed on his head with Thompson, punched the bag for an hour and then he was ready to go.
