WATER TRANSPORT ON THE CAPE-TO-CAIRO ROUTE.

The Cape-to-Cairo rallroad is a good deal in the public mind and is much talked of in a taken-for-granted way, and a discussion of this project brings out the natural line of attack on the continent. Henry Stanley, writing a few months ago, said: "The Cape-to-Cairo railway, which some appear to think is improbable, will be an accomplished fact before 1925, I believe." Now I do not believe it will, nor do I believe that Cecil Rhodes himself believes it will, nor do I believe that Ce-cll Rhodes has any notion of building a continuous line of railroad from the Cape to Cairo. It is inconceivable that he should be so injudicious. The total line would be about 5,600 miles, as well as we can tell by scaling off the dis-tances on the best maps. If we want a through line of steam communication overland from the Mediterranean to the Caps of Good Hope, we could save about 1,600 miles of railroad by using the Nile and the lakes. We should save, not only the interest on the cost building this 1,600 miles of railroad but a large part of the cost of mainten-ance and of operation-The Engineer-

of these are called to remain in Cen-tral or South America for the purpose of making a special study of the lan-guage and customs of the people for such use as may subsequently prove necessary.

SCENE OF OPERATIONS.

"The work of the expedition will be principally along the Magdalene river, which runs north from the highlands of Ecquador. This river I might par-enthetically add, is supposed to be the River Sidon, mentioned in the Book of Mormon.⁴ Of course, it is not known just when we will be able to reach there, but we expect to find ourselves in the City of Mexico about the last of July. After that we go to Yueatah, where we will visit the ruins already discovered principally Palanque, Copan, Chiken, and Titla. From there our course will lie via Guatemala to Nicar-agua where we will spend some time along the proposed route of the Nicaragua canal.

OVER THE ISTHMUS. "Then we will pass by degrees over the Isthmus of Panama until we ar-rive at the mainland of South America

when we will immediately begin our explorations along the Magdalene riv-The next step in our investigations will be in Ecuador, which will lead us to the high plateaus of Peru to Lake Titicaca and thence to Chili in the neighborhood of Santiago, from which place we will take ship for home, arriving at San Francisco. Arrangements have been made for a fifteen months' trip though it is not unlikely that we shall be gone for two years.'
