Local and Other Matters.

Horticultural Society. — A meeting of the Deseret Horticultural Society will be held to-morrow (Friday) evening at half past seven p.m.

Cow Herd. — George Anderson, the well known herdsman, announces that he will commence business for the season next Monday. Turn over the cows to him and spare your neighbors' gardens.

A Conflict. — A dealer in horse-drawn and a knight of the cleaver appeared before Justice Pyper to-day, to answer to a charge of engaging in a mutual battering match, and each was fined \$5. The man of horses got the worst of the tussle.

Assigned. — Yesterday, by proclamation of Governor Axtell, Chief Justice D. P. Lowe was assigned to preside in the Third District, and Associate Justice Emerson was re-assigned to the First District. Judge Lowe took his place on the bench of the Third District Court yesterday afternoon.

Prospering. — Recently a meeting of the stockholders of the 20th Ward Co-operative store was held and the reports showed it to be in a prosperous condition. A dividend was declared on stock for the previous six months. It is probably one of the most flourishing stores of its capacity in the Territory.

Body Found. — "A. C." writes from Brigham City, April 14: — "The remains of Ephraim Cutler, one of the men who perished in the avalanche in Cold Spring Canyon some time ago, was found this morning by a number of men who were in search of the two men. No trace has yet been discovered of Isaac Lewis."

Fireproof Roofing. — To-day we were shown, by Mr. Shoberg, of this City, specimens of slate, from a claim, owned by himself and Messrs. Daniel Miller and Sons, of Farmington, on Fremont Island, in the Salt Lake. The specimens were taken out at a depth of four feet, and split from blocks of two feet by four feet. The slate is of splendid quality, and just the thing for fireproof roofing.

Pettit Jury. — The following order was made in the District Court yesterday: — "Territory of Utah, Third District Court. "It is ordered and public notice is hereby given in open court that the court room of said court in Salt Lake City, in said District, on Saturday the 17th day of April, A.D. 1875, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, shall serve as petit jury at the next term of the District Court of the Territory of Utah, to be begun and hold on the first Monday of the month of May, A.D. 1875. And this order is to be filed and entered in the minutes of said court."

"Witness my hand this 14th day of April, A.D. 1875, at said Salt Lake City."

"D. P. LOWE, Chief Justice, and Judge of Third District Court."

Shouldn't be Done. — To-day Justice Pyper issued a warrant, at the instance of a resident of the 10th Ward, who complained that a neighbor of his had poisoned eight of his chickens, besides coming near doing the same thing to himself and family. One of the fowls was seen to stagger around and was killed for table use, but before

it was eaten seven others were observed lying around, having been poisoned, causing the abandonment of the intention of using the one that had been killed, and thus they were saved from partaking of the poison which impregnated the body of the fowl. We understand that Mrs. Cloggie and her son confessed to having poisoned the chickens.

The poisoning of chickens is not only a contemptible act on general principles, but is exceedingly dangerous, as it is possible by that means, unintentionally though it may be, to take human life. People should be very careful about how they use poison for any purpose whatever.

Time to Start. — The missionaries to Europe will take the 6 o'clock morning train, leaving Salt Lake City on Wednesday, April 23, or Wednesday, May 12, trying themselves as to which date they prefer; though it is desirable that as many go on the 23rd as can be ready. Should any wish to spend a few days in the States or New York City, they will need to start that many days in advance of the dates above named, and be sure to be in New York City on or before the 3d or 17th of May, in readiness to sail on the 4th or 18th of May, Tuesday being the days on which the Gulon line steamships leave New York.

The Reynolds Polygamy Case. — This morning, in the District Court, Judge Emerson rendered a decision on the point raised yesterday in the Reynolds case, by Messrs. Carey and Baskin, regarding the bearing of the appeal on the judgment, the District Attorney maintaining that the execution of the sentence should not be arrested.

Judge Emerson said that he saw no reason to change his views on the subject, being of the opinion, based on the express terms of the Organic Act, which provided that in cases wherein the United States were a party, that bonds could be given to abide the decision of the Supreme Court, and there appeared to be no reason why this should not apply in criminal as well as civil cases.

The District Attorney excepted to the opinion of the Court. Mr. Sutherland, counsel for the defense, addressing his honor, said he regretted to have to complain that notwithstanding the plain language of the Court, a warrant had been obtained by somebody whose zeal was far from being according to knowledge, and that the prisoner had been arrested and brought into court.

Judge Emerson said that surely the language of the Court yesterday could not well be mistaken, and the arrest was unnecessary.

District Attorney Carey said he had some question in his mind as to whether the case should be taken directly to the Supreme Court of the United States, or whether it should first be taken to the Supreme Court of the Territory.

The Court said that Mr. Carey should have examined the subject and satisfied himself. The Court was of opinion that it should go to the Territorial Supreme Court, which would meet shortly, when the point could be decided there.

General Crook. — The Ogden Junction yesterday says: —

Gen. Geo. Crook and staff will arrive here from the West to-morrow morning, on his way to Omaha, to take charge of the military department of the Platte.

John D. Lee's Trial Proposed.

BEAVER, April 14.

The Second District Court met pursuant to adjournment at 10 a.m.

Lee was brought into court by U. S. Marshal Maxwell, looking depressed and unwell, accompanied by his two wives Rachel and Caroline. The prosecuting attorney filed supplementary reasons for the continuance of Lee's case till the next July term. Bishop, from Pioche, counsel for Lee, objected to the filing of the second statement for a continuance of the prosecution, and read the original statement of claims, that a large number of the witnesses for the prosecution the marshal had been unable to find, and bring in to court, and he had never been called, but could not serve the subpoenas. That there were no other witnesses that the prosecution can prove the facts by, or come to trial without their testimony; that in consequence of the total lack of funds they cannot pay the witnesses, jurors and other expenses; that the case will involve a cost of one thousand dollars, and in consideration of the territorial auditor having refused any assistance from the territorial treasury, we are unable to come to trial this term. This case will involve the massacre of the Mountain Meadows, and will require from two to four months to prepare the case, and the expense of the necessary witnesses by the next term, and a portion of the \$25,000 appropriation by Congress to defray the expenses of the District courts of the Territory will be procured by that time. This application was not made for delay, and the prosecution will use all diligence to procure the witnesses by the July term.

Spoiler, for Lee, said the prisoner comes into court and resists the propositions on which the application for continuance is based. He was arrested on the ninth of Nov., 1874, since which time he has been confined in jail, which has already severely impaired his health, and further confinement will endanger his life. He has not sufficient means to provide for the expenses of this trial and the support of his family. He is entirely innocent of everything charged against him, and is ready and anxious for trial this term. If the case is continued it will be an act of gross injustice. The indictment was found on the testimony of ten witnesses, all of whom can be procured this term. The crime with which he is charged was committed over 17 years ago. All the witnesses endorsed on the back of the indictments reside within 65 miles of this city and could be summoned by legal process in three days; two-thirds of them are citizens of Beaver and are now in daily attendance on the court. The indictment had been found seven months; there had been two to me of the court since the arrest.

Bishop followed with an argument, adducing authorities as to the rule of continuance in criminal cases, showing that the prosecution had no legal grounds for the

motion; that the absent witnesses were not those on the back of the indictment; that the want of funds was no cause for postponing the trial; a speedy trial was guaranteed by the constitution, the prisoner was fully prepared and anxious, the marshal had not shown that any subpoena had been served on any of the witnesses on the indictment; that the government did not build battles for the confinement of prisoners till funds were raised for the prosecution by taxation or otherwise; that the witnesses and jurors were under obligation to attend whether paid or not, and if they refuse to comply with the process of the marshal there was abundant force at Ft. Cameron to compel them, and bring the unwilling stalling witnesses into court, in chains if necessary; and this government was not without resources; that John D. Lee was an old man, 63 years of age, and he comes before the court this day begging and pleading to be put on his trial. Bishop occupied an hour and a half in an able argument.

The court took a recess till two p.m., when the continuance was granted by Judge Boreman, and the prisoner was taken back to his place of confinement at Fort Cameron.

Accidentally Killed.

SILVER CITY, Tintic, April 14.

On Monday, as Mr. Daniel Oakley, of Diamond, Tintic, was going down the Julian Lane shaft he let go the rope and fell about forty feet; he was instantly insensible. Dr. Roberts of Provo was immediately sent for, but did not arrive in time to render any assistance to Mr. Oakley, who died this morning. He was highly respected, and his sudden death has cast a shadow over the camp. He leaves a wife and seven children.

Badly Crushed.

ALTA CITY, April 14.

At 11 o'clock to-day a man named Riley was badly crushed at the Reed and Benson mine, Big Cottonwood; he is supposed to be fatally injured.
