## Notorious Indiana Outlaw Run Down

After a Long Chase. Logansport, Ind., Jan. 17.-Marvin Kuhns, the desperado, who has terror-Kuhns, the desperado, who has terror-ized northern Indiana for weeks and defied the officers of two States. was captured last night at Green Hill, and is now in Logansport jail. Kuhns and his brother, who was released from the Columbus, O., prison shortly after Mar-vin escaped, were taken after a desper-ate field. Before the outlies was over the fight. erate stole a team at Plymouth Sun-day night and started south. Ex-Sheriff Marshall and Marshal Cheney traced them to Lafayette last evening and by elephoning neighboring towns located

them at Green Hill, near Otterbein. At Otterbein the posse surrounded the house and rushed in at midnight. Marvin was awake and seized a re-volver at his bedside. Before he could fire, Elmer Switzer shot him in the face and the posse closed in. One man jumped from the second-story window and escaped, but the brothers were

overpowered after a struggle, in which a number of shots were exchanged. Wounded as he was, Marvin partially shook off the attacking party and shot H. V. Volt in the back and Lewis Haw-kins in the arm. Neither was fatally injured

#### Plan Contemplates Bringing Over a Million Chinamen.

San Francisco, Jan. 18 .- The Call says that back of a steamship company re-organized in this city with a capital of

\$12,500,000 is a plan to colonize Mexico with oriental laborers. The promoters of the scheme, it is asserted, have obtained from the government of Mexico a vast concession of fishing privileges and lands adjacent to the fishing grounds. They propose to bring a mil-lion Chinese to Mexico and establish fisheries, canneries and warehouses all along the Mexican coast,

A circular has been issued in the Chi. nese language stating that "The Pacific Charter company proposes on behalf Mexican government to encourof the age Chinese as well as Europeans to come to Mexico where they will have special privileges.

The circular adds that "there is plenty of room for a million Chinese fishermen," and invites Chinese merchants to subscribe to the capital stock of the company, which it says has made contract with China and the Mexican government to admit free of duty for fifty years all Chinese necessaries, such as tea, rice, etc.

## SOLAR ECLIPSE EXPEDITION.

W. H. Crocker Offers to Defray Expenses if U. of C. Will Send One.

Berkeley, Cal., Jan. 18.-William H. Crocker of San Francisco has offered to defray the expense of a solar eclipse expedition to be sent by the University of California, from the Lick observa-tory to Sumatra to observe the total eclipse of the sun on May 17. An astronomer and assistants, with appar-atus from Mount Hamilton will sail from San Francisco on Feb. 19th to be away until July. They will establish an observation camp somewhere within twenty miles of Padang on the west coast of Sumatra. Prof. E. E. Barnard, of the Yerkes observatory, at Williams Bay, Wis., will also go to Sumatra. He will be the guest of Prof. Stephen T. #### Owner of El Commercio Imprisoned Incommunicado by Prest. Zelaya.

Managua, Nicaragua, Dec. 16 --- (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)--President Zelaya has imprisoned in-communicado Senor Jose M. Castillo, owner and director of El Commercio of Managua, the largest circulated daily newspaper in the country, and has suppressed the further issue of that jour-nal. This action, according to current public opinion, was taken because Sen or Castillo permitted an article to ap-pear in El Commercio a few days ago, written by some person in Granada which was not complimentary to the government, and which had not been submitted to the censor of the presi-dent. The editor of the paper, Dr. Manuel Colonal Matus, a jurist of high distinction and an able writer, has no been imprisoned. Until about three years ago, Dr. Matus and Presiden Zelaya were devoted friends, Matu. then being the leading member of Presfreed from the domination of the native
