The Roman censors frequently imposed taxes on unmarried men, and men of full age were obliged by law to marry, unless mentally or physically disqualified. In 1865 the English Parliament laid a tax on bachelors over twenty-five years of age, of £12 and 10 shillings for a duke, which was graduated down to one shilling for a common man.

A new method of computing interest on any number of dollars at six per cent. which appears simpler. Multiply any given number of dollars by the number of days of interest desired, separate the right hand figure, and divide by six, the result is the true interest of such sum for such number of days at six per cent. This rule is so simple and so true, according to all business usages, that every banker, broker, merchant or clerk should post it up for reference. There being no such thing as a fraction in it, there is scarcely any liability to error or mistake. By no other arithmetical process can the desired information be obtained by so few figures.

Artificial stone is made by simply mixing common lime with common sand. Where there is exposure to damp, hydraulic lime is preferable. Two breakwaters, at the outlet of the Suez Canal, in the Mediterranean sea, are faced with artificial stone blocks, of great size, made in this way, from sand on the spot. Stones, and coarse gravel give improved cohesion and may be freely mixed in. Under various patents there is, in European cities, a large substitution of artificial stone for other building materials, and some progress is being made in our Atlantic cities. The greatest advantage is in ornamental work; one would answer for any number of blocks, and all cutting is dispensed with. Some of the patents use silicate of soda; some make the sand fluid by cheap process; some employ pressure, others none. Where brick is made out of hydraulic mortar or plain lime mortar, the ordinary brick machine answers.—S. F. Times.
