We desire to call your attention to the condition of your store and ask your assistance to make it a success.

In February, 1893, we opened \$27,377.

At a duly called meeting of the stockholders it was decided to sell out our goods, and this has been done to the extent that we now own less than \$7,000. Over \$20,000 in cash has been realized from the sale above the necessary expenses of conducting same.

The stockholders' Democratic majority at once began to regret their hasty action, and the members of the stockholders' committee were compelled to leave the store.

The Mystic Library located by Deseret's door passed the rounds last night in the estimation of the author and the books were removed to the New Library. Today there are no more books in the store except those which have been sold.

"HEVER" the author, who has been the principal world wideponent of the "People's" cause, is coming to Salt Lake soon for the purpose of giving another exhibition, presenting his case and the principles of Socialism. He will be with us as well as "Sister" Kelly, a color Highwheeler. All will be arranged to O. P. Flores.

Last night the date fixed for the City Council to sit as a board of equalization and arbitration was postponed until the members sat in an adjourned session. The king of the session is to stand in his important robes to his entire duty to the public. The date is set for next Monday evening.

In case of a vigorous protest, there seems to be no way to prevent the session from being held.

The "Boys" Correspondent Returns His Reward.

SALT, BEAT, AND LITTLE WATER

A Home Recipe—Ginger Water—a Few Words on Health—Gold Dust at Last.

After leaving the California outfit, followed a narrow ravine of sand, so dry soil here for several miles.

On each side now perpendicular walls of dry, rocky, consisting of successive layers of gypsum, salt and sand. In places the road runs under the over-hanging walls and in other parts it is hardly room for the wagon to pass between them. In some places we seem to be in a grotto surrounded on all sides of immense walls of earth and with only a narrow strip of sky above us. The road through the washes, sandy, grade, but after a while you come out in a fully developed country, parched and dry as asphalt on the floor of which, where the road becomes rough and rocky.

The fine evening air made about miles and we camped on the top of a ridge. We had the fire burning and our horses were still when I crossed the river and gave them a start of water. In the meantime we were up early and, getting the horses the remaining water to the tanks, we resume our journey, hunting for water along the trail, which was very heavy and our progress very slow.

After half an hour we crossed the river again, and were still when we reached the place where we were to camp.

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
