Consider that all dentists should boil in water or its equivalent in dry heal or by fumiga-tion all their instruments and all mg-terial used in connection with or in the mouth, before and after use for every bottom terms dentiste are said to and when the other and after use for every patient, some dentists are said to, and even boast, that they sterilize their in-struments every evening only, and just wipe them off nicely after each pa-tient during the day. Just think, suppose the restaurants and hotels or in our homes that the table service was just nicely wiped off after each patron or each meal, during the day and at night give them a good scalding, maypossibly a theoretical scrubbing If you knew and had a choice, think you would not select that kind of vervice. So each dental patient should in simple justice to himself, be satisfied beyond a reasonable doubt that his dentist maintains this surgical cleanliness, when we realize what risks we may take in coming in contact with disease, possibly introduced from one person's mouth to another's in case the methods employed are not sanitary. Experience and ni-croscopic research has proven that out of 50 persons, representing the general public, and analysis of the contents of their mouths revealed the fact, that almost every disease was represented, finding their specific and pathogno-monic germs of each disease. Contem-plate this astounding fact! How easy it would be to communicate a disease from one dental nation to numberless. om one dental patient to numberless others. And your dentist's hands should receive as thorough scrubbing and anti-septic treatment as a surgeon's before a major operation. Don't think that washing the hands gently with perfumed soap, drying daintily with a soft linen towel and then scraping at the finger nails with a septic pen knife is the cleanliness I advocate. Many previously healthy persons at-

ter having obtained, possibly a slight dental service, have suddenly and unar-countably developed, consumption or catarth or almost any infectious or contagious disease.

The physicians and a great many dentists have known of this state of affairs to exist but at this period of pro-fessional progress it is not necessary but is mainly due to indolence or lack of study. Our law regulating the prac-tice of dentistry is quite lax in this re-spect, while the barbers are compelled by law to maintain specific sanitary regulations

While all dental colleges teach the most thorough cleanliness it will be more surey enforced by the vigilance of each patient. As to the family pumice dish it is a
