

SERVICES AT THE TABERNACLE

Elder Howard Garrett Reports His Mission to the Eastern States.

DISCOURSE BY ELDER PAUL.

Lectarian Ideas of Hell—The Plan of Salvation Revealed to the Saints—Redemption for All Mankind.

The services in the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon were presided over by President Angus M. Cannon, and were opened by the choir singing the hymn commencing, "Lo, the mighty God appears."

The opening prayer was offered by Bishop W. P. Preston.

The services were continued by the choir singing the hymn beginning with the words, "Jesus, once of humble birth."

Elder Howard Garrett, recently returned from a mission to the Eastern States, was the first speaker. He said the only purpose he had in standing before the people was to bear testimony to the work they had done in the cause of the Lord.

He left for his mission in 1898, and was assigned to labor in Greater New York, and, said he, it is astonishing what the Elders have accomplished there in the last two or three years.

The speaker had labored also in New Jersey, where he met men who thought the Elders in the early 40's, and their words had made such an impression upon them that they had never forgotten them. Elder Garrett said he enjoyed exceedingly the two years that he had spent in New York, and had labored there two years as the most profitable of his life. He bore testimony that he had seen the sick healed by the power of God, and had seen His power manifested upon the Elders in their preaching on the streets in the great cities of the land. The speaker gave strong testimony that Joseph Snow was a Prophet of God, and that those who would do the will of the Father would obtain an exaltation in the kingdom of God.

The next speaker was President J. H. Paul, who said he had nothing particular in his mind that was striving for utterance, and that it had been his experience that when he had something upon his mind that he would like to tell the people, he had seldom had the opportunity to tell it.

The speaker said that when he was trying to teach the Gospel to the world he did not have a specific knowledge of the divinity of the Gospel, and he felt that if the world had anything to give him that was better than that which he already possessed he was ready to accept it. When he was called to go out on the streets he demurred, but the servant of God told him that if he would go out and open his mouth the Lord would give him something to say. He went out and told the people that he and his companion were the friends of the Devil.

Mormonism, not easily detected, but picked up at random, and if they found them to be good fruit, or if they would compare favorably with the people of the world, the people must conclude that they are of the good tree.

The speaker then took up the subject of hell which he was addressing that Joseph Smith was inspired by the devil.

"What for?" asked the speaker. "Does the devil inspire men to call on people to believe that Jesus is the Christ?"

"A house divided against itself cannot stand."

Elder Paul said the people in the world could not believe that the Lord would reveal Himself to a small people in a remote section of the world. In answer to this the word of the Lord to Moses was quoted by the speaker, and the Lord said, "He had spoken to the people not because they were numerically great, for indeed they were but a few. Many other passages were quoted showing that those who would accept the truth and obtain entrance through the strait gate and narrow way would be few indeed but the people of all lands seem to say how can it be possible that the majority are in the wrong?" The Lord has said that the multitude would walk in the broad way, and the few who chose the way of life, would be persecuted and reviled and all manner of evil would be spoken against them for their faith. The speaker then brought forth the question from the sects, "Do you think that all the people of the earth will be lost except yourselves?" "No," replied the speaker, "all the world shall eventually be saved." What he received was the great and good of last night, also the stories of Plato, and Socrates and other sages. But the most remarkable Roman of them all, whose life was gentle and the elements so mixed in him that nature might stand up and say to all the world, this is a man, will they be cast into the abyss of unquenchable fire? "Yes, they will be cast into the abyss of fire," said the speaker, "eternal life suffering in hell, or eternal annihilation."

"The abdomen," suggested the speaker, "is the position of the man who stood between the Devil and the Deep sea." Several passages of Scripture were then quoted showing that all the dead should rise and be judged.

In a controversy on this point with an Englishman, the speaker asked him if the Queen of the Britons, Boadicea, who led her tribes in repelling the Roman invaders, had been consigned to the everlasting pains of hell? The Briton thought that it was an awful decree, but that there was no other way.

The speaker then quoted the words of Jonathan Edwards in his description of the torments of hell, which was as follows: "Men and women shall see their wives and husbands and children torn from them and cast into hell until they were packed like grapes in a wine vat, and the wrath of God would crush them until the blood spurted out and the flesh and spilt the garments of those around them."

Elder Paul then entered at length into the discussion of the subject of the preaching of the Gospel to the spirits in prison, who had disregarded the prophet Noah, and quoted from the Bible to show that according to the doctrine of the church the dead as well as the living would have the true Gospel preached to them. "We believe," said he, "in a Gospel that reaches as wide as the universe; in a kind and loving God who reaches after the souls of children." The speaker explained that those who came into prison shall be allowed to pay the uttermost farthing. "We left our Father's court upon high, to gain an experience, and after we have passed through this intermediate school we shall graduate to that realm where the wicked are free from troubling and the weary are at rest."

The choir sang the anthem "Hosanna." Benediction was pronounced by Elder J. C. Christensen.
