

FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

The cold snap continues. Another storm is expected.

Ex-Mayor F. Little left for California this afternoon.

Bishop's meeting to-morrow night at the Council House.

The office of the new Mayor last night and he is now installed.

The City Council will meet on Friday evening to consider the proposed new charter for Salt Lake City.

Edgar James H. Hart will leave his home in Bear Lake early in March for New York to resume his duties in the immigration business.

A private letter from Elder A. N. Macgregor conveys the information that his field of labor has been changed from the Thimble to the Glasgow district, and that he is in fair health.

The dreaded disease diphtheria has again made its appearance in Birmingham. There was a death in the family of the late Mr. J. H. Palmer, which, when in the hands of the physician, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. of that Ward. The public invited free.

The Cheyenne Leader says that on Saturday morning two lads, Jack Carey, 13 years and Lennie Dietrich, 11 years, were playing with a pistol, which, when in the hands of the little Carey lad, was accidentally discharged, the ball taking effect in the back of the right arm of Lennie Dietrich just above the wrist, passing through and was taken out by the attending physician from the opposite side of the arm, near the wrist, lying alongside one of the arteries.

At a public meeting held at Rawlins the other night the following was passed:

"That Sheriff Miller be requested to communicate with the railroad authorities and request them to keep the doors of all emigrant cars closed on arriving at Rawlins, until the occupants of said cars have been inspected by Dr. Maghee."

In accordance with the above, Sheriff Miller telegraphed Mr. Dickson and the request was granted, so that now all emigrant cars arrive there with locked doors, and Dr. Maghee then inspects them, when, if they are found free from infection, the doors are thrown open.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Mother Whitney Dead.—Mother Whitney, wife of the late President Bishop N. K. Whitney, died at 2:30 this afternoon.

Mexico.—A lecture will be delivered to-morrow night at the 20th Ward School-house, under the auspices of the Ward Institute, by Elder Heleman Pratt, Subject: Manners and Customs of the People of Mexico.

The Anti-Polygamy Bill.—A dispatch to-day says:

"The Senate has taken up the Judiciary committee bill for the suppression of polygamy in Utah. One new section adopted provides that any man cohabiting with more than one woman shall be fined \$300, or imprisoned for six months, or both, for each and every offense. The bill will pass the Senate this afternoon, there is no opposition."

Benefit Concert.—The concert in the 12th Ward School-house last night, for the benefit of the Sunday School, was a highly successful affair. It was under the management of Supv. T. V. Williams, assisted by Brothers T. A. Williams, S. Clawson and George D. Pyper. The programme was rendered to the entire satisfaction of the large audience.

Idaho.—The Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Idaho has authorized and paid for the publication of an excellent illustrated pamphlet by Prof. Strahorn, setting forth its status, prospects, resources, etc., for the benefit of the homeseeker, capitalist and tourist. We have received a copy by the courtesy of Hon. W. L. Webster, of Franklin. It contains a great amount of useful information, and the Idaho legislature is to be commended for its publication.

Madison Square Theatre.—We have received from Daniel Frohman, Esq., in behalf of the Madison Square Theatre, New York, the following note, accompanied by an ideal portrait of the heroine of "Emerald," executed by Mr. G. W. Presbury.

"We take pleasure in sending you herewith a souvenir of the 100th representation of 'Emerald.' Mrs. Frances Hodgson Burnett's play. The theatre has just concluded its second year. During this time the house has been open continuously, summer and winter, and but three plays presented—'Hazel Kirke,' 'The Professor' and 'Emerald.'"

A Voice from England.—We have been enabled to secure a very interesting letter to President John Taylor from Elder O. C. Ormsby, now on a mission in England. It gives a detailed account of his mission, and is too lengthy for publication in full. He speaks of the poverty-stricken condition of the working classes in that country generally, and expresses surprise that more help does not arrive for the poor from the comparatively comfortable relatives and friends in Utah. He says on this point: "It seems strange to me that the Saints at home who have passed through what hundreds of their friends and relatives are passing through now can rest contented in comfort and comparative luxury and not offer to aid in their deliverance. I meet many in this country who say they have relatives in Utah in good circumstances that offer them no aid. Many do not so much as write and give a few encouraging words."

It is to be hoped that the class of people residing here to whom Elder Ormsby alludes will take the hint and turn over new leaves.

THE TOOLEE EMBEZZLEMENT CASE.

In the Third District Court, at 10 o'clock this morning, the consideration of the case of Toolee County against Edward Bird, charged with embezzling about \$1,100 of county funds was resumed.

Upon the question of the official capacity in which Mr. Bird acted, Mr. P. M. Lyman testified that Mr. Bird was acting as deputy assessor and collector in Toolee County, in 1878, and acted in that position until March, 1879.

Mr. Bird was the chief person acting in those offices. The general public transacted their business with Bird or Mitchell. Records introduced which witness testified were kept in the handwriting of defendant.

Mr. John C. Sharp testified that in 1878 Bird was acting as deputy assessor and collector of Toolee County. Was acquainted with Mr. Mitchell, assessor and collector.

Cross-examination—Mr. Bird was asked if he was acting as assessor and collector for Bird for two years, and delivered all moneys collected to him, and also looked to Bird for remuneration for my services. In paying moneys collected to Mitchell or Bird, always received receipts in the name of those paying such taxes. Mr. Bird I supposed to be a deputy assessor and collector, as he had been in the community where I lived. I was only deputy collector in the matter of transient herds. Bird always signed the tax receipts.

Mr. John Rydahl knew Bird as deputy collector. I was acting under him. He was acting in that capacity all the time that I was so acting.

Cross-examination—I was collector in the matter of sheep herds. I was a month in the office of Mr. Bird, but considered Mitchell as chief assessor and collector.

Prosecution rests.

Mr. Enoch Martin, sworn for the defense, was cross-examined. He was so acting till March 29, 1879. Had charge of county records. The assessment blanks for sheep herds were left in my office after they had been filled up. Mr. Mitchell asked for more time from the County Court as he had had some trouble in collecting from transient herds. The only record of the collections is the scribble in the receipt books. On March 29, 1879, Mr. Lyman and others forcibly took the office away from me and I have since had no control of the books. The sheep herd accounts were then in the office.

Cross-examination: There was nothing else in the book except the sheep herd accounts. It may have been several days prior to the 29th of March, 1879, when I last saw that record. Don't know where that record is now.

Re-direct.—There were between 50 and 75 men in the mob who wrested the office away from me. A deposition of Mr. Mitchell assessor and collector of Toolee in 1878-9, was read. Had settled with Bird on tax accounts several months before the indictment was found. Could not obtain a settlement from the county. Bird has had nothing to do with the receiving of taxes after my term of office expired.

Mr. D. W. Wrench was acquainted with the assessment of sheep herds in 1879. There was some trouble between Salt Lake and Toolee counties which was taken before the county court, the former county claiming that the assessments had been made too early, and that Toolee county had no right to assess in such cases. Mitchell could not give a satisfactory explanation to the court, and the time was extended to the sheep herd assessments, then being done as to which county was entitled to the taxes. My term of office expired before Mitchell's.

Cross-examination: The time was extended in June, 1878; could not tell how long the extension was to be, but sufficient to recomple the tax assessments.

F. M. Lyman recalled: At the general election in 1878, the candidates of the people's party were elected by a majority of 300. We sued for mandamus, as the present incumbents would not vacate. The certificates of election were given and the officers-elect duly qualified. We went to the houses of Burnester, Bird and Martin to persuade them to deliver the records to those duly elected, but they would not. The assessment rolls for 1878 did not contain the assessments of Mr. Bird. There has not been any effort to settle this case with the county court. On showing the discrepancy to Mr. Martin he appeared sorry and wished to correct the error. It was not done and the money for which Bird gave receipts were not accounted for.

Cross-examination: I told Martin if he did not issue the certificate, I would prosecute him before the court. There were probably not more than 30 persons in the posse which took the offices.

Enoch Martin recalled: In regard to signing the certificates of election, I did not do so voluntarily. Mr. Lyman put his fist in my face, and said he would have me put in "prison" if I did not issue the certificates.

The arguments were then made by the respective attorneys.

This afternoon the jury came into court with a verdict of not guilty.

Appreciations.—Last night, after the conclusion of the City Council meeting, the officers and Council of the City, including Mayor Jennings, proceeded to the residence of the retiring Mayor, F. Little, Esq., by whom they were cordially received and welcomed. Addresses were delivered by Aldermen Raleigh and Dinwoody, Councilor Joseph F. Smith, Aldermen Pyper and Calder, Recorder Gaine, City Attorney A. Miner, Marshal Burt, Councilor John H. Smith, Assessor and Collector Winder and Mayor Jennings. Each of the speakers expressed their respect for Mr. Little, and alluded to his devotion to the public interests during the six years he had served the people in the office of Mayor. Mr. Little responded in fitting terms, when the party withdrew, after a very pleasant interview.
