Admitting that drivers should at all times observe the speed regulations, the writer goes on to say that the public body should take measures to blame for many of the accidents that happen. He adds further: "I have been a teamster in this city since 1893, and it has been my experience to come into daily contact with people who will walk over a crossing, looking neither to right nor the left, and I often have to pull up my team to avoid an accident, when I had the right of way at that time. Pedestrians should look around before starting across a street, to see that there is no danger. I think the law that keeps a check upon drivers should work both ways, and compel discretion on all parties concerned."
