SPRINGVILLE. WILLIAM BRAMALL DEAD.

A Highly Respected Citizen to be Buried Sunday.

Springville, May 2 .--- William Bramall departed this life at the age of \$3, at 9 m. today from general debility. The we photo was taken 29 years ago, lie he was on a mission in England. William Bramall was a son of Samuel and Mary Barlow Bramall and was

born at Plunbloy, Cheshire, England, Feb. 16, 1824. He was baptized a hiember of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by William Parr Jan. 15, 1841. He was ordained to the Aaronic priesthhood in 1842, by Charles Hawthorne, ordained an Eider by John Johnson in 1844 and labored as a local missionary for five years before emigrating. Came over in the ship Ar-so in 1850, in Jeter Clinton's company. He remained in Council Bluffs two Years, and came to Utah in 1852 by ox team and located in Springville, where he fived until his death. In 1857 Mr. Bramall was called by President Young with the 70 elders who started on missions, leaving Sait Lake City with handcarts across the plains, remaining on his mission in born at Plunbley, Cheshire, England, Feb. 16, 1824. He was baptized a

Lake City with handcarts across the plains, remaining on his mission in England until 155, when he was called home with the rest of the elders on account of the United States army in-vading Utah. In 1860 he was again called to England on a mission and remained three and a haif years, and was presiding elder over the Redding, Southampton and Dorset conferences. He returned June 3, 1863, in charge of BY emigrants in the ship Amazon, moshing the plains in Capt. Haight's company. Again in 1878 he was called the Great Britain on a mission, and pre-

sided over the Nottingham conference. remaining nearly two years, returning with nearly 250 saints to Sait Lake. In his ministry he has baptized over 1,200 souls, besides ordaining many to he priesthood, blessed numbers of hildren and organized new branches a the British mission. In his labors in the British mission. In his labors at home he was first counselor to Bish-op Aaron Johnson for three years, was one of the presiding seven presidents of the Fifty-first quorum of seventles for four years, and was ordained a high priest in 1892, and has been an earnest worker as a teacher, and as a home missionary, always willing and on hand to make any sacrifice for the yosnel.
