Irrigation is building up a new empire in the Snake river valley. It is the greatest body of irrigated land in the United States. GOODING is the only new town in this empire which is located on the main line of the Oregon Shorn Line raliway. South of the townsite lies the lands of the North Side Twin Falls project with its 180,600 acres, the South Side Twin Falls project with its 240,000 acres of irrigated lands and to the south of this lies the Salmon River and Cedar Creek projects with a combined acreage of another 200,000. GOODING is in the center of the 70,000 acres to be reclaimed by the Big Wood River Irrigation company and north of GOODING lies the great Camas Prairie with its more than 150,600 acres of agricultural lands, surrounded by one of the best grazing countries in the west.

Through the center of these projects flows the mighty Snake river which furnishes more water for irrigation, at its minimum flow, than any other stream in the whole of the arid portions of the United States

Along that portion of the Snake river lying within these irrigation projects there are more natural water falls than in any other river in the United States. Dry Creek fails are a short distance below the great Milner dam and are 70 feet high. A few miles lower down are the Twin Falls, 175 feet high, three mlies below these are the famous Shoshone Falls, 210 feet perpendicular fall, five or six miles further down the river are the Auger falls, 184 feet high, and still within the limits of these irrigated lands are the upper and lower Salmon falls each some 80 feet. In the vicinity of the Salmon falls are found the Black Canyon, the Thousand Springs and the Malad river. At each of these points there is a possible electrical power of from 20,000 to 50,000 horse power and the volume of water in the river is doubled by these tributaries within a space of 15 miles. At the Thousand Springs and also at the Malad power planta are now in the course of construction. The Great Shoahone Falls Power company has its plant at Shoshone falls installed and in operation and it at work on its Salmon falls plant.

GOODING is located within from fifteen to thirty miles of these great power plants. An electric rallway is now being built from Milner to connect with the main line of the Short Line at GOODING. This electric railway is the first unit of a system which will thread this new empire with a net work of trolly lines and will have a trunk line south to connect with the Southern Pacific and the Western Pacific systems in the Nevada mining regions and will bring southarn Idaho 400 miles nearer to San Francisco that it is at present. GOODING, remember, is the function of this electrical system with the main line of the Oregon Short Line Railway and will be the outlet of southern Idaho for this system

As a fruit producing section Lincoln county tops the market with all kinds of temperate zone fruits such as peaches, pears, plums, prunes and apples. Lincoln county apples brought as high as \$4 a box this fall in Chicago markets and produced as much as 1,000 boxes the acre of land .- Can you beat H?
