The Prohibitionists held a national convention not long ago, when they declared their views on the tariff question, and the protectionists have denounced them equally with the Democrats as advocates of free trade. Here is the resolution which was in troduced at Indianapolis:

"That an adequate public revenue being necessary, it may properly be raised by import duties, and by an equitable assessment upon the proper-ty and the legitimate business of the country; but import duties should be so reduced that no surplus shall be accumulated in the treasury, and that the burdens of taxation shall be removed from foods, clothing and othe comforts and necessaries of life."

Who can fairly construe this as a free trade declaration? It distincly pronounces in favor of a modified tariff. the fable of an Austrian advance to Salonica but it was still revived at every opportunity.
