MOORE, Sept. 1.—News comes this morning of the lynching of 54 negroes, in the vicinity of Millington, a village in the Cherokee Co., Ohio railroad. For a year or more the people of that part of the county have been kept in a continual state of excitement by the acts of incendiarism. Burns and burnings have been frequent, and the buildings on the Millington Fair grounds were destroyed. Suspicion pointed to Dan Hawkins, Robert Johnson, Vernon Williams, Ed Hall, John Hayes and William Wain. Yesterday they were arrested near Kirtland, in the western part of the county, by Deputy Sheriff Buchanan. Later in the day they were taken to Millington, where they were confined in the jail.
