FOREIGN NEWS.

ENGLAND.

Fenianism continues to absorb a great deal of public attention. Preparations for the holidays, at the theatres, and particularly in London, were being made on an extensive scale; though there was a great deal of suffering in places among the laboring classes.

The Times fears the Abyssinian war will be protracted until next season, and blames Napier for the delay, and thinks that nothing will be done the present season.

IRELAND.

The Irishman, a Dublin paper, prints the following before its principal leader, which it heads "Government by Gallows":

"Doom of Irish political prisoners in the 29th and 30th year of the reign of her 'gracious Majesty, Queen Victoria, the Merciful'—Hanged: William Philip Allen, Michael O'Brien, and Michael Larkin. Died from prison rigor: John Lynch, John M'Geogh, John Fottrel, William Meagher, William Kennedy, Richard Stowell, William Harbison, and John Kelly. Rendered insane or paralysed in goal: J. J. Joyce, M. M'Feely, and Edward M. (hospital report.) Died in exile: Thomas Francis Meagher, Michael Doherty, Terence Bellow, M'Manus, Richard D'Alton Williams, Bartholomew Dowling, and Thos.

Devin Reilly, and many others of minor note."

Many of the Irish papers contain very inflammatory and exciting articles on the execution of the Fenians at Manchester, and the insurrectionary spirit seems to be still active.

FRANCE.

The Corps Legislatif have had some heavy debates on the question of intervention in Roman affairs. Jules Favre opposed it and urged that the legislative body should express disapprobation of it. He reproached the government for acting without consulting the legislative body; and he regarded the proposed Conference as a chimera. Contrary to the expectations of many M. Thiers defended the intervention, but reproached the government with having no fixed policy.

ITALY.

General Garibaldi, when leaving Varignano for Caprera, addressed the following words to the Italian troops who had him under their guard:—"I regret that an unfortunate circumstance for you and for me should have led to our mutual acquaintance. No matter! I hope that circumstances favorable for you and for me will not delay in bringing us together. With valorous soldiers like you, Italy ought to march onward and reach its object." The battalion of bersagliers did the military honors to Garibaldi, who embarked with his son, his son-in-law, and his friend Basso; he was also accompanied, but not with his own consent, by Colonel Camozzi, whose duty is to keep watch over Caprera and prevent the general from leaving the island; but just at present one does not well see where he could go to if he did leave.

According to the official journal of Rome the Garibaldians are still on the watch for an opportunity to renew their attack on the territory of the Pope:

"In various places in Tuscany near our frontier many Garibaldians with red shirts are gathering together, and in Orvieto enlisting offices are opened for volunteers to whom is given a premium of forty-five lire, and a pay of two lire a day. Glove Attigilano, and other places beyond the Tiber are peopled by Garibaldians. Some of them were seen armed and headed by a certain Micoi, on the hill of Chia. At Volturno a band of sixty Garibaldians has united with the intention of surprising by night the neighboring frontier villages. In the environs of Sera there are, although disbanded, about 3,000 Garibaldians, of whom a column of 500 has been formed, destined to set out for Rieti. To these facts is to be added the not less serious incident which took place when the 621 Garibaldians who were kept at Civita Vecchia were sent back to their homes, according to the sovereign disposition of the Holy Father, who chose to respond to their wicked attempt with such generous clemency. When they were asked to declare upon their honor that they would not take up arms any more against the Government of the Holy See, they openly and with malice prepense refused, so that it became necessary to intimate to them that if they returned they would be treated according to the rigor of the law. From the facts, and those alluded to in our number of the 21st, it appears evident that a new blow is being organized against the territory now left to the Holy See, nor is it therefore to be wondered at if tranquility cannot yet be consolidated among our peaceable population, especially those near the frontier."

The Observatore reports that "Six hundred muskets have been found in a cave outside the Porta San Paolo; ten cases of double axes, with contrivances for fitting in daggers; forty-nine Orsini bombs, all charged, was found last Saturday, and a box containing upwards of 100lb. of gunpowder, in one of the cellars of the Capitol."

RUSSIA.

Russia has addressed a note to the French government earnestly protesting against the policy of the latter on the eastern question.

CHINA.

Advices from China report that the rebels are meeting with much success in their operations against the Imperial forces.
