

GERMANY
AND MONROEISMEmperor William's Favorite Poet
Writes Upon Question.

FAVORS THE UNITED STATES

Hopes It Will Extend Its Authority
Over Latin America - Contest Be-
tween Germanic and Latin Races.

Berlin, Feb. 17.—Ernest von Wildenbruch, Emperor William's favorite contemporary poet and sometimes for that reason called the court poet, has written an article on "Germany and the Monroe doctrine," in which he says it is clearly in line with Germany's interest and policy to join with the United States in maintaining the doctrine and expresses the hope that the United States will extend its authority over all Latin America.

"This," he says, "may be the greatest struggle of the twentieth century. It will be a contest of the Germanic race against Latinism. Germany started the struggle against it in 1898. It is the American century, and it is in the American century that the Germanic race must continue its struggle. Germany can be in its struggle no longer than it can be in its struggle to where its sympathies and its soul should go."

Ernest von Wildenbruch urges Germany to make an explicit and positive declaration in favor of the Monroe doctrine so that all the world may know where she stands and thus remove any doubt whatever that Germany is with the United States and that Germany has absolutely no occasion to be hostile to the Monroe doctrine and on every occasion support it."

Doubtful Convicted of Manslaughter

Bates, Ida, Feb. 18.—Linnus J. Douglas has today been convicted of manslaughter by the jury in the case of the killing of Rufus Ayres on the 20th last. The two young men, who were on bad terms, met at a dance on Saturday night, Feb. 14, and Douglas shot Ayres in the chest with a .22 caliber revolver. The latter then shot at Douglas and the two were shot and killed.

Stock Losses Reports Exaggerated

Bates, Ida, Feb. 18.—The reports circulated respecting the loss of stock in the state as a result of the recent cold weather have been greatly exaggerated. Idaho sheepmen have lost in the state in fact, no more than usual during the winter season. Two or three owners who drove their flocks to the desert above Idaho Falls have lost about 20 per cent loss.

Teens Establish War Taxes

Carmichael, Feb. 17.—A partial decree issued today establishes a war contribution in the form of an extra duty of 10 per cent to be levied on all imports. The export duty on cotton is 10 per cent, on hides 10 per cent, on cocoa beans and on hides four bolivars a hundred pounds.

To Save Elk in Wyoming

New York, Feb. 17.—Steps were taken today to save the 10,000 starving elk on the Teton-Yellowstone reserves. Snow seven feet deep keeps the feeding ground, and temperatures as low as 40 degrees below zero have added to their sufferings. News of critical condition of the elk herds here today, coming from the elk of the United States rangers to the Teton-Yellowstone reserves, who help the winter in New York. 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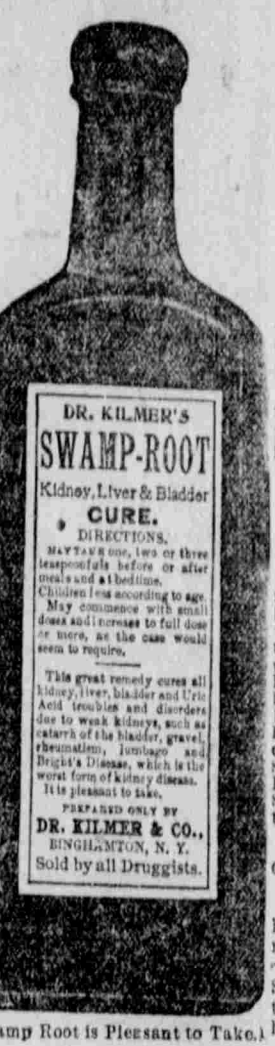

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SHEEP ON FOREST
RESERVATIONSInterior Department Will Enforce
Its Regulations.

JUDGE HANBURY IGNORED.

His Decision Would Defeat Real Water
Storage Object for Which Res-
ervations Are Set Aside.

Washington, Feb. 17.—The interior department will continue to enforce its regulations providing penalties for the passage of sheep on forest reservations notwithstanding the decision of Judge Hanbury of Seattle that such regulation is unconstitutional. The department takes the position that nullification of its regulations regarding sheep trespassing would defeat the real water storage object of forest reserves. The Seattle decision is in line with a decision of several years ago by a California court, but the attorney general has advised the secretary of the interior according to the department that the right to make the regulations which the Seattle court holds to be unconstitutional is conferred by the act of Congress of June 4, 1897, authorizing the department to regulate the occupancy and care of forest reserves.

Platt Amendment and Isle of Pines.

Washington, Feb. 17.—Representative Richardson of Tennessee today introduced a resolution asking the president why that portion of the Platt amendment regarding the Isle of Pines has not been enforced. He also introduced a concurrent resolution declaring that it is the sense of Congress that the Isle of Pines is territory belonging to the United States and that no sovereignty can be lawfully exercised there except by the United States.

Chaplain Gavitt to be Court Martialled.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 18.—The News today says: Frederick R. Fumston, commander of the department of the Colorado, has ordered a court-martial to try Chaplain H. C. Gavitt of the First cavalry, for conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman. The charge is the outcome of the chaplain's alleged refusal to pay a debt claimed to be due a Chicago business house, and contracted while the chaplain was stationed at Fort Sheridan. The court-martial is ordered to convene at Fort Logan on March 2. Col. J. W. Bubb of the Twelfth infantry, stationed at Fort Douglas, will be the president of the court. Capt. Carter of the Fourteenth cavalry has been detailed to act as judge-advocate. There will be 11 other officers on the court. Pending the court-martial, Chaplain Gavitt has been placed under arrest at his post in Fort Bayard, N. M.

WYOMING LANDS WITHDRAWN

Done Under Instructions of General Land Office.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Feb. 17.—The Cheyenne land office today received instructions from the general land office to withdraw from entry, except under the irrigation act, a strip of land in northern Laramie county, varying in width from 12 to 30 miles and extending entirely across the country from east to west. This tract comprises 750,000 acres of the richest agricultural land in the country, on both sides of the North Platte river including the well known Goshute Hole section, and will be under the first to be constructed under the national irrigation law. The reservoir will be situated at the headwaters of the Sweetwater river, in Natrona county, 20 miles above the land withdrawn from entry in Laramie county. Athens, N. Y., Feb. 17.—Three more deaths from typhoid fever occurred today of students of Cornell university. They were Otto Wula of Rochester, N. Y., Henry A. Schoenberger of Hackensack, N. Eleven physicians today reported eight new cases and eight other cases were sent out of town, the Cornell authorities today reported a further plant at once costing \$150,000.
