

THE NEW CULLOM BILL.

In the Senate of the United States, December 5th, 1883, Mr. Cullom asked and, by unanimous consent, obtained leave to bring in the following bill; which was read twice and ordered to lie on the table:

§. 401.—A BILL TO REORGANIZE THE LEGISLATIVE POWER OF THE TERRITORY OF UTAH.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the legislative power of the Territory of Utah shall be vested in the governor and a legislative council. The council shall be composed of nine members, who shall be citizens of the United States and qualified voters in said Territory; and a majority of said council shall constitute a quorum. All the powers heretofore granted to the Legislative Assembly of said Territory shall be vested in said legislative council, subject to all the limitations and restrictions imposed by existing law. And the provisions of section eighteen hundred and fifty-four of the Revised Statutes of the United States shall be applicable to the members of said council.

Sec. 2. That the legislative council aforesaid shall be organized by the choice of a president from one of the number, by a majority vote, and such necessary additional subordinate officers as are provided for in section eighteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised Statutes; and no other subordinates or attendants shall be allowed to said council or paid by the United States or said Territory. All the provisions of existing laws of the United States heretofore applying to the legislative assembly of said Territory shall be in force in reference to the acts and proceedings of said council; and all sessions of said council shall be public.

Sec. 3. That the members of said council shall be appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate of the United States; and the terms of their commission shall be three years respectively, except the members first appointed, one-third of whom shall be commissioned for one year, one third for two years, and one-third for three years, and thereafter each shall be commissioned, when appointed, for the full term of three years. And the compensation for each member shall be as heretofore provided by law for members of the Legislative Assembly of said Territory, and paid in like manner.

Sec. 4. That the first session of said council shall commence at such time as the Governor, by proclamation issued not less than thirty days prior, shall fix, after the appointment of the members of said council; and thereafter said council shall meet at such times as may be fixed by law; and each member shall, before entering upon his duties, take the oath heretofore required of a member of the Legislative Assembly of said Territory.

Sec. 5. That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this are hereby repealed.
