When our flag was first unfurled from the staff, an aged Spaniard was heard inveighing, with lugubrious earnestness, against the pertinacity with which that flag had pursued its fortunes. MEMORIALS TO CONGRESS.—No. of memorials received in the two houses since 1840, 32,950; of which 21,000 related to slavery, directly and indirectly; referred to river and harbor improvements; 2500 to duties on foreign imports; and the residue, 6450 to miscellaneous subjects. Of the abolition and anti-slavery petitions, 18,000 were received from the New England States, 1500 from Pennsylvania and New York, and 1500 the residue, from the remaining Western and Northern States.
