WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:  
Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 25.19 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 22 degrees; maximum, 47; minimum, 22; mean, 24, which is 2 degrees above normal.

Total excess of the daily mean temperature since the first of the month, 2 degrees.  
Accumulated deficiency of daily mean temperature since January first, 33 degrees.

Precipitation for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m., .45 inch.

Precipitation since the first of the month, .45 inch, which is .19 inch above the normal.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is below the normal in all sections west of the Mississippi valley, being highest over the central Pacific and west gulf coasts and the R. N. W. territories.

Low pressure areas are central over the north Pacific states, Colorado and Nebraska.

Precipitation occurred over portions of Utah, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Texas, British Columbia and Manitoba.

It was snowing at time of morning report over portions of Washington, South Dakota and Nebraska; and raining along the north Pacific coast. The temperature was below zero over southwest Utah, Montana, North Dakota, Manitoba and Alberta.

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RAIN APPARATUS  
FOR THEATERS.

What Eastern Playhouse Managers Are Doing on Fireproofing Question.

INTERESTING IN SALT LAKE.

Conceded 'Fireproof Scenery'

'But Thinks the Artificial Shower-Producer O. K.'

Theatrical managers who appeared yesterday at the public hearing before the aldermanic committee on buildings upon the ordinance relating to fireproofing of scenery entered objections by the wholesale, says the New York Herald.

The proposed ordinance provides that every place of public amusement shall have an asbestos curtain which shall be raised and lowered at the close of each act. Moreover, it provides that all separate pieces of scenery shall have a fireproof covering.

The first speaker was Heinrich Corried, who declared that the so-called fireproof scenery was useless so far as preventing fires was concerned.

"I approve of the section of the ordinance relating to the asbestos curtain," he said, "but the real safeguard is to equip the stage with a rain apparatus."

Mr. Corried explained what he meant by the "rain apparatus." He would have, he said, an overhead sprinkler which would deluge the scenery with water at the slightest sign of danger.

A downpour of artificial rain, he said, between the stage and the audience in the event of anything like a stage fire would do away with any apprehension that anything else. Mr. Corried suggested that the board of aldermen order that at least four firemen be assigned to the stage of every theater independently of the two firemen provided by the city.

Charles T. K. Miller said he thought it a hardship to the theaters to have to have the asbestos curtains between the acts. At the Casino, he said, the asbestos curtain is kept lowered until the opening of the play, and to obey the terms of the proposed ordinance would need the services of at least four extra men at every performance.

Alderman Sand went to know if one man could raise and lower the curtain, or if the stage hands might not be trusted with the work.

Mr. Corried and Mr. Miller both said that the men assigned to the asbestos curtain should not be taken away from any other work during the time they are "told off" to care for the curtain.

J. J. Wyatt, of the Columbia theater, said it would "kill the finale" to lower the heavy asbestos curtain between each act. His curtain, he said, weighs more than 4,000 pounds.

"Which is better," asked Alderman Harburger, "to kill your finales or to kill your audience?"

"There is no question of that," Mr. Wyatt replied. "We take all the precautions and lower the asbestos curtain before and after the show in the presence of the audience."

Mr. Corried said he believed it would be an injury to the theaters if the traveling companies were concerned to put the fireproofing ordinance into effect immediately. Several questions were asked as to the character of the fireproofing compound required, but at no time was any one able to answer them.

The committee adjourned with the understanding that it might submit a report a week from today.
