LOCAL BRIEFS.

Humorous Results.—Yesterday afternoon was given up at the high school to tests in elementary work, especially in spelling, geography and American history. Some of the results were decidedly humorous.

Banquet at Wandamere.—Seventy persons attended the banquet given by the seventh grade pupils of the Sugar House school to the eighth grade pupils at Wandamere. The decorations were carnations and pansies.

Annual Memorial Services.—The Modern Woodmen will hold their annual memorial services tomorrow morning in Odd Fellows' hall, whence they will march to the cemeteries, with the Twenty-ninth Infantry band to furnish music.

No Quorum Present.—There was not a quorum present last night hence the meeting of the city board of education had to be postponed indefinitely. The regular monthly meeting of the board will be held on next Tuesday night.

Hit by an Automobile.—W. Sims, while riding a wheel in front of the Knutsford last evening, was struck by an automobile, driven by J. McCoy, who claims Sims' was on the wrong side of the street. The latter was unhurt and his bike smashed, but he escaped injury.

GEORGE L. MOATS FALLS TO DEATH

Well Known Salt Laker Plunges Down Mine Shaft at Dugway.

DECAYED TIMBERS BROKE.

He Fell at Least 85 Feet to the Bottom of the Four Metals Mine.

While engaged in taking samples from the 300-foot level of the Four Metals mine, at Dugway, Tooele county, Wednesday afternoon, George L. Moats, a well known Salt Laker, fell to his death. The body was buried beneath a heavy mass of earth that went down with it, and it took 12 hours hard work on the part of Moats' companions to dig out the remains.

HOW IT HAPPENED.

Mr. Moats was manager of the Four Metals, and had gone to the property with O. Meyers, an eastern stockholder, and Charles Sandall, for the purpose of sampling the ore in some of the lower levels, which had not been worked for a considerable time. The three men had secured averages from a number of drifts, and it was while Mr. Moats was at work lower down, that the decayed timbers gave way and he fell at least 85 feet to the bottom. The crash was heard by Messrs. Meyers and Sandall, and in a very short time a force of men was engaged digging out the body. The work was extremely dangerous, but there was no letup until the remains had been recovered.

PROMINENT HERE.

Mr. Moats was well known in business and mining circles. He was the vice president of the Rank Real Estate & Investment company, manager of the Eastern Consolidated Mining & Smelting company, and of the Utah Lead Mining company. He was an active member of the Real Estate association and Commercial club. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Anna Bessinger. The body is at the undertaking establishment of Eber W. Hall, and the funeral will be held Sunday.
