SENATOR HALE GIVES A LECTURE

Contends That the Senate Does Too Much Talking and Not Enough Work.

HOUSE FAVORS FREE SEEDS.

Members From the Farming Districts Outvoted Those From the Cities.

Washington, Jan. 29 .- The senate session today began with a lecture from Senator Hale, who contended that too much talking and not enough work was being done. He had particular reference to his inability to secure the passage of the diplomatic and consular and fortifications appropriation bills, which were on the calendar.

were on the calendar.

Before the session ended the two measures had been disposed of.

Senator Beveridge concluded his three-day speech on his child labor bill. His argument today was devoted to the constitutional power of Congress to prohibit interstate commerce in child-made goods. He took the broad ground that the power of Congress over interstate and foreign commerce is absolute, that such commerce can be prohibited altogether, so far as the power is concerned, and that in all-cases policy and not power is the point to be considered. The house today passed the senate bill increasing the board of customs appraisers in New York from 10 to 12.

The agricultural appropriation bill occupied most of the day and, as usual, when the amendment strikting out the free distribution of seeds was reported the members from the farming districts outvoted those from the cities, reversed a ruling of the chair by a vote of 135 to 85, and restored the paragraph as has been the law for years.

An important amendment was adopted that no part of the money appropriated for expenses in the enforcement of the national pure food law should be paid to any state, city or district official, the amendment being based on the theory that the states should execute their own pure food laws.

After completing nearly 50 pages of the bill the house, at 5:20 p. m., adjourned until tomorrow.



About two hours after the explosion three men were lowered into the shaft in an improvised bucket. Before descending 62 feet two were overcome and the other was barely able to give the signal to hoist. Further attempts were abandoned. Air was supplied by large fans, but the mechanism was damaged and the fans were idle for about two hours. The fans have been started again and if the men were not all killed it may be that they will have air enough to survive until the rescuers reach them. The Stuart mine has only one opening, although an entry has been driven to connect with a parallel mine a short distince away. The shaft has three compartments, two for the cages and one for air, Smoke and dust poured into the airshaft for hundreds of feet from the ventilating compartment, and it was wrecked.

It is stated that nearily all the men were at work in the entries near the bottom of the shaft. No official announcement of the disaster or its causa has yet been made by the officers of the company. That dust caused the explosion is stated by persons at the scene, but the investigation may prove otherwise. It is stated that little or no gas has been oncountered.

IMMIGRATION TO MONTANA.

Mass Meeting Calls on Legislature to

Eutte, Mont., Jan. 29.—A Miner special from Helema, states that at a mass meeting of the citizens of Montana, at which every section of the state was represented, resolutions were adopted calling upon the legislature to enact legislation providing for an immigration bureau as a means of inducing settlement of Montana, appropriating \$25,000 for the purpose. Through this immigation bureau it is proposed to advertise the resources of Montana. Resolutions were adopted requesting the legislature to regulate "the rapacity and greed" of the fire insurance companies operating in this state. The 25 per cent increase in the fire rates since the San Francisco disaster was protested against. Congress will be memorialized to survey the unsurveyed public lands in this state. The legislature is urged to provide a suitable fund for the carrying on of experiments in dry farming. The session was presided over by Associate Justice Henry C. Smith.



Am. Institute of Social Service Holding an Exposition of Them.

New York, Jan. 30 .- The first annual exposition of safety devices held under the auspices of the American institute of social service, opened yesterday at the American museum of natural his-

the American museum of natural history. The exposition was largely attended yesterday.

Every sort of device that will tend to lessen the number of accidents and deaths is on exhibition from the portable fire escape and oil lamps that can be tipped over when lighted without exploding, to gas jets that shut off automatically when the gas is blown out. Window guards that will enable one to clean the windows of the sky scrapers without danger of falling off; eleyator locks that work in such a fashclevator locks that work in such a fash-ion that gates on each floor have to be locked or else the car cannot proceed, automatic couplers and safety scaf-folds are among the exhibits.

Again, there are devices for the pre-vention of short circuiting, safety thea-ter doors that can be used in case of

vention of short circuiting, salety thea-ter doors that can be used in case of fire; safety brakes for street cars; tackle to prevent the fouling of life-boats during the process of lowering, and permitting the tackle to unhook automatically when the boat louches the water; safety fenders for trolley cars, automatic engine stops for big machinery and some 300 other devices are also to be seen.
