LOCAL BRIEFS.

Eagles Dance.—The Salt Lake Eagles will give their monthly dance this evening in the Mackintosh block.

Scarlet Fever at Post.—There are two cases of scarlet fever at Fort Douglas, which are being cared for by the post authorities.

Sewing Club Bazaar.—The Busy Bee Sewing club of the Woodbine Circle 41, Women of Woodcraft, held a bazaar Thursday evening, in Odd Fellows' hall, which was successfully conducted. Refreshments were served.

Meet at Richfield.—Southern Utah sheepmen will meet at Richfield Saturday, to discuss necrobacillosis with State Veterinarian A. C. Young and Secretary C. B. Stewart of the Utah Woolgrowers association.

An Eastern City.—David Boudin of Tacoma, Wash., writes to Secretary Ferkles of the Salt Lake Real Estate association stating his intention of locating in "some eastern city," and desires information about Salt Lake as he may be minded to live here.

Street Railway Employees Election.—Members of the Amalgamated association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, division No. 82, are today holding their annual election. The polls are open from 9 o'clock in the morning to 7 o'clock tonight.

Chas. Wilkes A Visitor.—Charles Wilkes is in town from Goldfield, Nev., where he is in the warehouse business. He remarks with a somewhat pathetic tone that Goldfield has dropped its population from 12,000 to less than half that number, on account of the subsidence of the local mining boom.

Donation Party Successful.—There were 150 people in attendance on Thursday evening's donation party at the Wellington hotel where a goodly sum was raised for the benefit of local indigent G. A. R. veterans and their families. An address was made by Rev. P. A. Simpkins, Mrs. Montgomery recited, and there was a program which was much enjoyed.

Attorney Ashton Lectures.—At Thursday evening's lecture before the Salt Lake bank clerks, on commercial law, Attorney E. C. Ashton spoke of the relations of lawyers in banks and in trust companies. In the former case, the relation is that a debtor and creditor, while in the latter case, depositors of trust funds have no claim to their funds over regular depositors in event of the company's failure.

Crush in Murray.—The advance orders for The Christmas News in Murray have been so large that it has been found impracticable to send them down on the platforms of the street cars as usual. The News agent in Murray, Mr. Lauritzen, therefore will drive a four horse team up from Murray tomorrow and take the supply down by wagon during the afternoon. THREE COASTERS RUN DOWN BY CAR

Boys on "Schooner" on J Street
Hill Meet Serious
Accident.

POLICE TO WATCH HILLS

Chief Has Ordered All Coasting
Stopped Where Street Cars Offer
Danger—Crew Not Blamed.

Alexander and Jack Johnson, brothers, 17 and 15 years of age, of 609 Sixth avenue, and Julian Butler, 14 years old, of 353 J street, while riding down J street on a tow double-runner "schooner," ran in front of and were struck and dragged more than 100 feet by westbound third avenue street car No. 414, in charge of Motorman D. O. Parker and Conductor E. B. Kelsey, all sustaining serious injuries, a little before 6 o'clock Thursday night.

Alexander Johnson's left arm was fractured between the elbow and the wrist, and he was badly bruised. Jack Johnson is in a precarious condition, as he is suffering greatly from internal injuries that have caused frequent heavy hemorrhages and may prove fatal. Julian Butler is badly bruised, lacerated all over the body, and though his injuries are painful, it is not believed that they are dangerous, unless unforeseen complication should develop.

The injured boys were taken into the home of U. S. Surveyor General Thomas Hull, 17 Third avenue, and Dr. J. C. Landenberger was called. After examining Jack Johnson, he ordered an ambulance to be rushed to the house, and the Johnson brothers were removed to Groves L. D. hospital. Young Butler was carried to his home.

According to those who saw the accident, the boys were riding down J street on a double-runner coaster at terrific speed. They saw the street car coming down Third avenue when the sled had reached a point about 15 feet from the corner, but they did not stop the sled. Motorman Parker saw the boys, but his car was speeding at such a moment that he could not check it. The car caught the boys just as their sled ran between the rails, dragging all of them to a point directly in front of the Hull home, and the motorman could not bring it to a standstill in less than 100 feet.

All who saw the accident declare that it was miraculous that all three of the boys were not instantly killed. According to Police Lieutenant Anderson, the sled was running at a high rate of speed, and the boys were not to stop at the corner, and this man-date will be strictly enforced.

INSULTING NEGRO ARRESTED.

Clarence Hale Taken In for Accosting
Women on Street.

It will be a cold day before Clarence Hale, a mulatto, 24 years old, again attempts to insult white women by following them, giving vent to vile epithets and obscene language, pulling them by the hair of the head, and forcing the sidewalk into the street.
Hale did all of these things, Thursday afternoon, about 15 different white women, who were walking along the sidewalk, and he was taken into custody by the police or else told friends who did. Then angry husbands, fathers, brothers and sweethearts began to call the police station, angrily inquiring whether the insult of women had been arrested. Six different men calmly informed the police that they were going out on a man-hunt, and if they found Hale, they would shoot him.
The police force got busy right away to prevent a lynching here or worse, and Detective Wheeler and Janney captured Hale at Third South and Fourth East streets. The negro resisted the arrest, and was quickly and effectively subdued by the detectives and taken off to the jail.

A big crowd, consisting largely of angry women who had suffered from Hale's outrageous insults, quickly gathered around the detectives and their prisoner, and in a few minutes Wheeler and Janney had to fight their way through the mob, which threatened to man-handle the negro.
