WHAT CANVASS SHOWS.

The result of the contest shows that ignorance and carelessness on the part of voters in the matter of marking their

ballots changed the election. Out of the 17 spoiled ballots rejected by the court, 14 were for Hartenstein and on-by these wave of Earty. Some of the the by three were for Hartenstein and on-ly three were for Ferry. Some of the voters in addition to putting their cross in the proper place drew lines and crosses through the names of all the other candidates on the licket. Some put the cross up under the emblem in-stead of within the circle provided for it, and others spoiled their ballots by spilling ink over them and blotting them.

In the Forty-second district one straight American ballot contained the name of "Elizabeth Tuckfield" writ-ten by pen under the party emblem. This ballot was rejected and thrown out by the court. All of these errors, some intentional and some not, empha-size the necessity of adopting the vot-ing machines for elections which would avoid any such m'stakes.
