MEASLES AND INFLAMMATION IN THE  
SOUTH.—We regret to learn that in some  
portions of Southern Utah measles and in-  
flammation are exceedingly virulent, many  
children having been carried off by them.  
Brother Andrew S. Gibbons, of Long Val-  
ley, writes under date of the 10th inst., as  
follows:

Editor Deseret News: Dear Brother:—I  
undertake the painful duty of writing the  
account of the death of three of my chil-  
dren, which you would do me a great fa-  
vor by publishing in your paper. A disease  
supposed to be measles accompanied by in-  
flammation of the lungs and the throat,  
has carried off quite a number of children  
throughout the southern settlements, but  
has only just commenced in Little Valley,  
in which out of some eleven cases, four  
have died. My son Charles R., died April  
7th, aged 4 years, 9 months and 23 days.  
My daughter Emeline, died April 6th, aged  
1 year, 11 months and 1 day. My daughter  
Adeline died April 7th, aged 1 year, 11  
months and 2 days, all three being buried  
in one grave, those three are the children  
of Andrew S. and Ritzpah Gibbons. Also  
my grandson Andrew G., son of John S.  
and Martha Carter, died April 2nd, aged  
2 years, 2 months and 21 days. Also Char-  
lotte Carter, died April 11th, aged 4 months  
and one day. The work of the destroyer  
has cast a deep gloom over our settlement,  
and there is no telling where it will end, as  
there are a great many that have not had  
the measles, particularly children; and as  
we have just found a resting after being  
broken up on the Muddy, we are poorly  
prepared to take proper care of the sick.

## A Dead King Roasted.
