GOOD WORDS FOR UTAH.

Major Breeden Discusses Local Situation in Indianapolis.

The Indianapolis Star of June 9 has the following:

Having twice received the title of attorney general at the hands of the people of Utah, M. Breeden, formerly of Ogden, naturally all the more proud of his state and after a short stay in Indianapolis, will leave this morning for Salt Lake, there to further reeve in his official capacity.

In one respect, especially, Mr. Breeden's section in 1904 also his re-election in 1904, is noteworthy: Of the entire state of Utah, he is the only one not a "Mormon." This does not exclude the governor.

"Utah is coming into her own," said Mr. Breeden last night, "slowly, but surely. The religious questions and agitations which beset the people in the past are all over, and the people will be at peace. Polygamy is not practiced—at least not openly."

"And Reed Smoot?" "Senator Smoot never had but one wife. Of course he was one of the Apostles of the Church which upheld polygamy, but he never practiced it."

"How do the people out there feel about his senatorship?" "Opinion is divided. There is an anti-Mormon faction in Utah. There is a party in the country not so far from the truth as to say that Senator Smoot should not be a good official. He should be permitted to keep his seat."

"Altogether, Utah is going to be a state for the country and not a pound of it," said Mr. Breeden. "Salt Lake has just acquired a new railroad and two others are coming in. The state is rich in resources and only needs railroads to bring them out."

Mr. Breeden, while in Indianapolis, was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Noel, 1025 Central avenue, to whom he is related.
