UTAH CON. SURVEYS. Aerial Tramway Line Over the Oquirth Range Has Been Located. The engineers of the Utah Consolldated company have completed the survey of its proposed aerial tramway line over the Oquirrh range of moun-taings to the smelter site located in Tooele county and on which the com-pany expects to build a smelter some-time in the future. The length of the line will be but little in excess of the one operated at the present time be-tween the mine and the loading sta-tion in lower Bingham. It is understood that the company has had a survey made for a proposed line of railroad which is to be operated between the new smelter and a junc-tion point with the Westorn Pacific and San Pedro, Los Angeles & Sait Lake railroads a short distance west of the Garfield smelter of the American Smelt-ing & Refining company.
