Registration for the coming election this fall was commenced today and the registrars were at their post of duty from 8 o'clock this morning and will continue to register voters up to 9 o'clock tonight. Fainting Woman Taken from Office of Paul Flegel.

Paul Flegel, who claims to be a hypnotist, palm reader, etc., who has been arrested for violating the license ordinance, is in trouble again, and also in jail, and the circumstances surrounding his arrest are suspicious and serious, to say the least.

Quite late on Saturday afternoon a L. D. S. hospital ambulance backed up to Flegel's office, 142 Main street, and a moment later came with a woman in an armchair. She was placed in the ambulance and taken to the hospital.

Physicians summoned to attend her intimated that a criminal operation had been performed. Flegel declared that he was told by a woman to do this, and she was seized with cramps. Later he admitted that she had been there all day, and that she had been sent to him by his partner, R. M. Matthews, from Los Angeles, with instructions to put the woman in a hospital.

The woman is Mrs. Mamie McMahan. She is said to have declared that Matthews was her best friend and she proposed to stand by him to the last. She said she had gone to Los Angeles with him and that he sent her back to the hospital. Yesterday Flegel told "Clair Sheets" that Matthews was responsible for the woman's condition. It is likely that the Los Angeles police will be asked to place Matthews under arrest.
