HYPONOTIST IN TROUBLE.

Fainting Woman Taken from Office of Paul Flegel.

Paul Flegel, who claims to be a hypnotist, palm reader, etc., who has been arrested for violating the license ordinance, is in trouble again, and also in jail, and the circumstances surrounding his arrest are suspicious and serious, as will be seen.

Quite late on Saturday afternoon a L. D. S. hospital ambulance backed up to Flegel's office, 142 Main street, and a moment later the "professor" was seen coming down stairs with a woman in his arms. She was placed in the ambulance and taken to the hospital. Physicians summoned to attend her intimated that a criminal operation had been performed. Flegel declared that the woman came to his office and was seized with cramps. Later he admitted that she had been there all day, and that she had been sent to him by his partner, B. M. Matthews, from Los Angeles, with instructions to put the woman in a hospital.

The woman is Mrs. Mamie McManis. She is said to have declared that Matthews was her best friend and she proposed to stand by him to the last. She said she had gone to Los Angeles with him and that he sent her back here to go to the hospital. Yesterday Flegel told Chief Sheriff that Matthews was responsible for the woman's condition. It is likely that the Los Angeles police will be asked to place Matthews under arrest.

SUBSTITUTION AT TABERNACLE

Elder Charles W. Penrose Addressed a Large and Interested Congregation.

OBSERVE THE SABBATH DAY.

Such Practice Will Benefit One Physically as Well as Spiritually—Some Remarks About Duty.

Elder Charles W. Penrose of the council of the apostles, was the speaker at the services in the tabernacle yesterday afternoon. There was a large congregation present, and the discourse was listened to with deep interest. The meeting was in charge of President John R. Winder. The opening selection by the choir was the hymn commencing "Come, dearest Lord, descend and dwell."

Elder Joseph S. Wells offered prayer. The anthem, "From afar, gracious Lord, Thou hast gathered Thy flock," was sung by the choir.

Elder Charles W. Penrose referred to the rule of closing the gates of the tabernacle square for one hour during the Sabbath day, and the confusion occasioned by people leaving the tabernacle during the services was not entirely due to strangers who had dropped in as a matter of curiosity, to inspect the building and to listen to the music. Members of the Church are sometimes in the habit of going out of the building before the worship is ended. The practice is wrong, he said, no matter who indulges in it. Sabbath day worship should not only be a duty, it should be a pleasure. The latter-day saints should go to the house of prayer on the Lord's day and worship in the manner set forth in the word of God to the commandment governing this subject is as binding as the other commandments of the Almighty.

Some workers of the auxiliary organizations of the Church consider that when they have performed the duties pertaining to those societies, their labors are at an end. This is not right, declared Elder Penrose. Duty well performed is a direct path to the kingdom of God, but a Sunday school teacher, for instance, should not think that when the school is over he has nothing further to do for the day. It is his duty to attend the tabernacle services, and his own ward meetings in the evening, where he may partake of the sacrament. A proper observance of the Sabbath day is beneficial physically as well as spiritually. It should indeed be a day of rest. The observance of the seventh day of the Sabbath has been changed, and the first day of the week, the day that Christ arose from the tomb, is now observed as the Lord's day. The Lord has commanded the latter-day saints as to the day they should observe, and that day is the first day of the week.

Salvation by faith alone is the great doctrine of the sects in the modern Christian world, said Elder Penrose. They rely upon the saying of Paul, "By grace are ye saved through faith, and that not of works lest any man should boast." The speaker admitted that it is indeed by the grace of God that salvation has come into the world. It was by grace that the Son of God was sent to redeem the world from sin, and it is by the grace of God that the atonement of Christ is not sufficient to enable men to obtain the salvation that is offered to them. The Apostle James taught that faith without works is dead, and there is a connection between the teachings of James and the teachings of Paul on that subject. They, as well as the other apostles, taught that redemption comes only through obedience to the gospel plan as laid down by the Son of God. Paul's epistle to the Romans, chapter II, verses 6-11, was cited to prove this.

The speaker said, By man came sin and death into the world and by man came also the resurrection and the life. Through disobedience on the part of our first parents, mortals were separated from their Creator, but through the righteousness of one, even Christ the Lord, the way was opened whereby fallen man, by seeking righteousness, could regain what he had lost. Man, as he is, is an immortal being, and man will receive that which he merits. Christ is the Way, the Truth and the Life, and through His atonement will come universal resurrection. By His sacrifice the sin of Adam was atoned for, but still man has to live by the works of the Mosaic law, but by an actual turning away from sin and yielding obedience to the gospel of the Father as taught by Christ the Son. Not to him that saith Lord, Lord, and keepeth not the commandments, shall the redemption come, but to him that doeth the will of the Father.

The principles and doctrines observed by the Latter-day Saints were not taken from books, declared the speaker, but have been revealed from the heavens in the latter times. They appreciate the Bible, both the Old and the New Testament, but they do not recognize that these books contain all of the word of the Lord. The Latter-day Saints believe that the word of the Lord is continually being revealed, and that the ancients-day Saints, God is invariable and unchangeable, and we are as much His children as any who ever lived, and as much entitled to be enlightened of Him.

The speaker quoted from the fourth chapter of Ephesians to show what officers had been placed in the Church by the Lord and for what purpose. The commission given to the eleven apostles of primitive Christianity were slain, apostasy entered the Church, and thereafter unauthorized men arose and formed sects and creeds in accordance with their own notions.

In the nineteenth century the Father and the Son appeared to Joseph Smith and re-established communication between the heavens and the earth. He was also visited by divinely sent messengers, who conferred keys and gifts and powers upon him, and he was enabled to preach the gospel to every nation, and administer its ordinances, and the same authority has been conferred upon the Elders of the Church.

Through faith men will be saved, if that faith be made manifest by good works, and that faith which is accompanied by good works, shall turn from evil followed by authorized baptism, brings remission of sin, and one who complies with these requirements is a fit subject to receive the Holy Ghost. This is the regeneration spoken of by the Son of God, and he who has thus been cleansed is required to go forward in well doing, loving God with all his might, mind and strength and loving his neighbor as himself. The same gospel that is preached to the living applies also to the dead.

Elder Penrose referred to the recent death of three young missionaries, and said that there was no doubt that they were "washed on the other side" and that they had been saved by the faith which they had been engaged in here.
