## BOND PROPOSITION VOTED DOWN.

Little Interest in Election Shown  
By Light Vote—234 Favor  
And 312 Oppose Bonding.

## DR. EZRA C. WILLIAMS DEAD.

August Weddings—New Citizens Admitted—Convalescent Escapes Watchers.

Ogden, Utah, Aug. 2.—The proposition to bond the city for \$75,000 for the extension of the sewer system in the first ward, was lost in the special election held here yesterday.

Little interest was taken in the subject and the vote was remarkably light, the total number polled being but 546. The bonds were voted in but one ward, the first, where the greater portion of the sewers would have been constructed. In that ward the issue carried by the small majority of 23. The chief reason for the defeat of the proposition lay in the fact that the subject was complicated in the public mind at least, with the waterworks question, the voters opposing the bond issue on the ground that it would make it more difficult for the city to obtain the waterworks system. If this further bonded indebtedness were incurred for other improvements.

Furthermore, a large number of taxpayers did not understand that the expense of constructing would be paid for by the property owners in the district where the work would be done, the city simply insuring the bonds and making the property as security. The vote in the various wards follows:

First—For, 112; against, 50.  
Second—For, 20; against, 32.  
Third—For, 12; against, 25.  
Fourth—For, 41; against, 56.  
Fifth—For, 41; against, 65.  
Totals—For, 234; against, 312; majority against, 78.

## INVALID ESCAPES WATCHERS.

Glenn Cardoe, the young man who was seriously injured about a week ago while driving out near the Hot Springs and who has not yet thoroughly recovered his mental faculties since the accident, got away from his home last night and caused considerable excitement for a short time. The boy has been in the hospital since the accident until yesterday afternoon, when he was taken to his home on his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Cardoe. He was informed with the notion that he should go to visit a young woman who was in the bureau with him and his companions at the time of the accident. He was dissuaded for a time, but during the temporary absence of his attendant the boy slipped out of the back door and came down into the business district. It was some time before he was located and then he did not wish to return home, but was finally persuaded to do so by Frank Livingston, the other young man who was in the rig with him.

## INJURED MAN SENT HOME.

Nick Jerke, the young man who was hurt in the leg in the depot yards last Friday, and who since that time has been at the city jail, left last night for Milwaukee, Wis. Recent developments have corroborated Jerke's story about himself in every particular, showing that he was a machinist in hard luck. He was enabled to go, as his father telegraphed money to Chief of Police Browning and asked that a ticket be purchased and the boy sent home. A man received Monday by the injured man conveyed the information that his brother was one of the victims of the explosion on board the Bennington mail-of-war in San Diego harbor two weeks ago.

## OMER AND HOMER CALL.

Happy Reunion of Oldest Twin Brothers in the Church.

Rigby, Fremont Co., Ida., July 25.—For some time there has been talk of a reunion of the families of Omer and Homer Call, twin brothers who have lived at Willard, Utah, for many years. As several of the children have married and settled in this neighborhood, it was decided to hold the reunion here this year. Accordingly, Elihu Call came from the Peabody Conservatory of Music, Baltimore, Md.; others came from Provo, Salt Lake City, Willard and other places, so that when they met yesterday the number of the family present, including the wives and husbands of the married members, was just 100. This number is about two-thirds of the living descendants of these two brothers, who are a little upwards of 71 years of age, the oldest twin brothers in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and next to the oldest in the United States.

In the forenoon a business meeting was held by the family at the home of Omer S. Call, Rigby, where the temple work for the 1,800 dead relatives whose names they have been the principal topic of discussion. Then dinner was spread in the opera hall, where the family and a few invited guests, among whom was the Rigby brass band, in numbering 125, sat down to a sumptuous feast. Dinner was followed by a program, in which humor, mirth, and music were conspicuous features. "But the principal part of the day's enjoyment was reserved for the evening when the family gave a free entertainment to all present. The commodious opera hall was literally packed and the guests came felt very sorry for any friends who happened to be absent.

Where all was excellent, it seems ludicrous to specialize, but the fine mezzo soprano voice of Miss Margaret Call, a graduate of the Brigham Young university, Provo, and the rich tenor of Elihu Call from Baltimore, called for unstinted applause and hearty encores.

A sketch of the family history by Atty. J. O. Call of Brigham City, and an original poem by Mrs. Esther Call of the house and driving the family of Cyrti Call when located near Nauvoo in 1845, were highly appreciated. He was also the singing of "The O. L. Fight" connected with the Mormon Battalion history, by O. and H. Call in their own inimitable manner.

## THE TOWER OF IVAN THE TERRIBLE.

The section of wall and the tower shown in the cut mark one of the most historic spots in the great Moscow Kremlin. It was from this tower that the pitiless czar used to gaze down upon the execution of his enemies. It is 322 feet in height and is topped by a



gilded minaret. It contains thirty-four bells, aggregating 580,000 pounds. The Kremlin contains many great bells. One of them, called the Czar bell, has fallen from its tower and now rests on a pedestal in the palace square. It weighs nearly 150 tons and is sixty feet in circumference. It is reputed to be the largest bell in the world.

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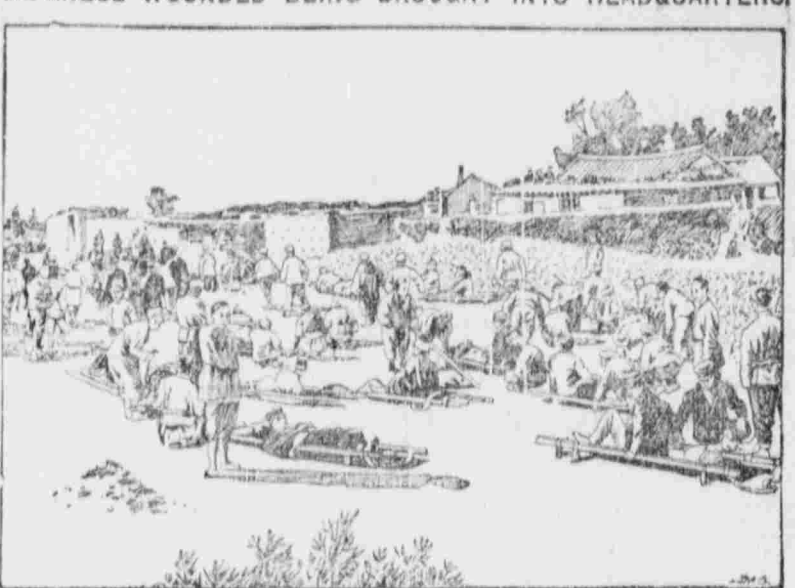
