

PREST. PENNA TO PREST. ROOSEVELT

Unusual Importance Attaches to
Exchange of Felicitations
Between Them.

AMERICAN FLEET AT RIO.

People Enthusiastic Over Its Arrival—
Battleship Messengers of Friend-
ship and Good Will.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Something more than the usual degree of importance attaches to the felicitous exchanges between the presidents of America and Brazil over the visit of Admiral Evans' fleet to Rio, owing to the significant expression used by President Roosevelt in accounting for the mission of the battleship fleet. The correspondence by cable, made public today, follows:

"From President Penna to President Roosevelt:

"This afternoon I had the great pleasure of receiving and becoming personally acquainted with the admirals and captains of the American fleet as it came to Rio de Janeiro, and that the people of our capital spontaneously and enthusiastically joined the Brazilian naval authorities from the very first moment in the demonstrations of fraternity and friendship toward the American sailors, and the republic of the north, for whose glory at Brazil, utters the most cordial wishes.

"Signed
AFFONSO PENNA,
President of Brazil."

President Roosevelt's reply to President Penna:

"I thank you for the kind message which you were so good as to send me upon the arrival of the American fleet at Rio. It has given me and will give to the American people the liveliest satisfaction. We are all very sensible of the courtesy and distinguished hospitality with which the government and people of Brazil have received our officers and sailors. The warships of America exist for no other purpose than to protect peace against possible aggression and justice against possible oppression. As between the United States and Brazil these ships are not men-of-war, but are messengers of friendship and good will, commissioned to combine with you the long continued and never to be broken amity and mutual helpfulness of the two great republics.

ENTERTAINING THE FLEET.

Rio Janeiro, Jan. 15.—The president of the republic, Dr. Penna, entertained the admirals and some of the higher officials of the American fleet at a breakfast today at Petropolis. Later in the day there was a garden party at the American embassy in the same suburb. Though Rear Admiral Evans could not be present at these functions, the fleet was well represented by Admirals Thomas, Emery and Sperry, Capt. Osterhouse of the flagship Connecticut, Capt. Wainwright of the Louisiana, Capt. Hubbard of the Minnesota, Capt. McCrea of the Georgia, and Capt. Murdoch of the Rhode Island.

The breakfast of the president was given at the palace, which was beautifully decorated with flowers and greens, and the Brazilian and American flags. There was a warm interchange of fraternal greetings, Dr. Penna speaking eloquently and in the warmest

terms of the friendship entertained in the Brazilian republic for the great republic of the north.

In reply the American ambassador, Irving B. Dudley, warmly thanked the president for his allusions to the relations of friendship existing between the United States and Brazil and for the magnificent reception which awaited the Americans on their arrival in this country.

The American officers and other invited guests went to Petropolis early in the morning. They were met by the representatives of the president and by the American ambassador. Later at the breakfast they met among other high officials, the Brazilian minister of marine, Admiral Alencar; the minister of war, Marshal Hermes Fonseca; the chief of the naval station and the members of the president's personal staff.

Nearly a thousand persons attended Ambassador Dudley's garden party, some 500 or more specially invited guests coming by train, together with two or three hundred officers and high officials.

Rear Admiral Evans is improving and tomorrow may be able to come ashore.

LT. CROWFORD'S BODY FOUND.

Washington, Jan. 15.—The body of Lieut. John W. Crawford, private secretary to Admiral Dewey, was found today below Fort Foote on the Maryland side of the Potomac. His disappearance on Nov. 22 last, leaving a note to a friend that he was driven to end his life by financial troubles. He was last seen on a ferry boat between this city and Alexandria, but as no one saw him jump overboard, some doubt remained as to his having carried out his announced purpose. Admiral Dewey was among those who doubted the suicide theory.

Lieut. Crawford came from Vineyard, N. J., 20 years ago, and although without naval education or training he ranked as lieutenant after his appointment as secretary to Admiral Dewey.

GOOD THINGS TO EAT AND TO HEAR

Political Friends and Personal
Admirers of Mr. Bryan Have
A Dollar Dinner.

GOOD WORDS FOR PRESIDENT.

Presence of Leading Populists May
Mean Breach Between Them and
Nebraska Democrats Closed.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 15.—Nearly 1,300 political friends and personal admirers of William J. Bryan attended in the capacity of donors and speakers the dollar Democratic dinner at the Lincoln auditorium tonight. Half as many more occupied seats as spectators and heartily applauded the good things said about Democracy and Mr. Bryan himself. It was the largest and one of the most successful functions of the kind held in Lincoln since Mr. Bryan became an influential factor in the politics of Nebraska and was intended as an endorsement of his candidacy for the presidential nomination and a declaration that he was in the minds of those present the logical choice of the party.

Of those present probably a thousand were Nebraska men, but there was a sprinkling from nearby states, and a considerable delegation from Missouri and Oklahoma. The speeches without exception were aggressively Democratic, but some good words were said for President Roosevelt and kindly expressions for radical leaders in the Republican camp. The dinner began shortly before 8 o'clock and the speaking program an hour and a half later.

It was explained for Mr. Bryan that such remarks as he made were extemporaneous, and that he did not feel it necessary to designate his subject. He felt that with so many distinguished gentlemen of the party from abroad to entertain the banquet, he should be allowed to enjoy the feast as a listener and play a minor part as a spectator.

The presence of a number of leading Populists, following the action of their state central committee today in declaring for Bryan as their presidential choice, was looked upon as an evidence that the breach between the Democrats and their allies had been healed and that it means fusion between the two parties at least in this state.

Gov. Broward of Florida, said that prior to 1896 the same plutocratic influences dominated both parties but in that year the line of battle was drawn. Mr. Bryan, he said, was a platform in himself.

"My friends, I am here in the home of him who is dear to the heart of every Oklahoman—he whose counsel and wisdom have aided us in laying the foundation for honest government, peace and plenty. Our motto in Oklahoma, is derived from him and it reads:

"Let the people rule" and upon this motto we have declared that Oklahoma shall forever be blessed by him who is willing to live on the fruits of his own honest industry, and cursed by his ambitious to prosper by graft, greed and monopoly."

Wm. J. Bryan spoke briefly. He said that while many differ as to the paramount issue he would name one issue that all could agree upon. It is "Shall the government be run for the people, by the people, and not by the few for the few?"

"The few are interested," he continued, "in denying labor its just reward."

be a candidate for president or not, but I have got to a point where, if the party goes far enough to overtake me, I shall not strain myself to get away. I say I do not know yet, but I should rather close headquarters and make a campaign without an organization than to draw funds from a source that I was ashamed to tell about."

ALLEGED EX-CONVICTS AND COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED

Napa, Cal., Jan. 15.—Federal secret service agents last night arrested John Brady and S. Johnson, alleged to be ex-convicts and leaders of a gang of counterfeiters. Brady's 14 year old grandson, James, was also taken into custody.

Other members of the Brady family, it is said, are being kept under surveillance. The officers assert that the gang has been manufacturing silver dollars in large numbers and passing them chiefly in San Francisco and Vallejo. When the Brady house was raided, the officers discovered a complete counterfeiting plant. Dies, acid and burners were found and several new dollars still in the dies. The members of the Brady family had some 50 of the coins in their possession.

The coins are exceptionally close imitations and would almost escape detection were it not for a slight lightness in weight. The finding is clear and the dies show the work of an expert.

NATIONAL BANKS.

Bill to Limit Loans for Speculative Purposes.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Senator Owen today introduced bills limiting the speculative loans of national banks for the purpose of dealing in stocks and agricultural and other products to their unimpaired capital and surplus; forbidding national banks to receive deposits in excess of 10 times the amount of their capital and surplus; providing for the creation of a liquidation fund through a tax on all national banks imposed by the comptroller of the treasury to keep on hand \$100,000,000 in the United States notes, which shall be issued on securities other than bonds of the United States up to 55 per cent of their market value.

GOV. HUGHES IS SILENT.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 15.—Gov. Hughes still maintains silence regarding the movement in favor of his endorsement for the presidency by the Republicans of this state.

The governor was interrogated today by the newspaper men, but declined to say anything for publication. It can be authoritatively stated, however, that

the governor's attitude in this matter is that while he appreciates the honor shown in a movement for his nomination, he will not in any way discourage the movement, nor will he use his official position to influence a single vote in favor of him or in any other aspect of the matter.

BLACK HAND OUTRAGE.

Pietro Onarato and Family Are the Victims of It.

New York, Jan. 15.—An explosion which the police lay to the "Black Hand," occurred at an early hour this morning in a tenement house in East Twenty-ninth street, shattering the front of the building, breaking windows in nearby buildings and almost causing a panic in the wards of Bellevue hospital, which are located on that side of the hospital towards the building where the explosion occurred. The explosion seems to have been directed toward the family of Pietro Onarato, a coal and wood dealer, who with his wife and three children live in the building. Onarato states that Dec. 15 he received a letter signed "Black Hand," in which he was directed to place \$1,000 on the grave of a certain Italian in a Brooklyn cemetery within a month, on penalty of being killed with all his family. No one was seriously injured in the building.

PRUSSIA HAS A DEFICIT.

Berlin, Jan. 15.—It was announced officially today that the subscription to the Prussian loan amounted to \$45,250,000. An indefinite amount was asked for, but inasmuch as the Prussian minister of finance, explaining the budget to the diet Jan. 8, said the government expected to cover a deficit of \$11,500,000 by a loan of \$62,000,000, the remainder of the deficit to be met by additional taxes, it is thought the expectations of the government have been disappointed.

Nevertheless, the Prussian State bank, in making a brief announcement, refers to the "success" of the loan.

OHIO TRUST CO. CLOSES.

Norwalk, O., Jan. 15.—The doors of the Ohio Trust company here were closed today. A voluntary assignment was announced. H. L. Smith of Cleveland and H. E. Barnes were appointed receivers.

Mr. Smith is one of the assignees of the Norwalk Steel and Iron company and the William Kavanaugh company of this city.

The bank officials say they expect to pay depositors in full.

The bank was established in 1903. The last statement shows deposits of \$112,000 and loans to the extent of \$580,000.

A NEW SWIMMING RECORD.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Frank Sullivan, swimming director of the Illinois Athletic club, last night established a new professional record for remaining under water, staying in the bottom of the tank for three minutes. The former mark of 2:20 was held by Finney, an English swimmer, and was made several years ago at Philadelphia. The Briton gave his exhibition in a glass tank, in which the water was kept at a temperature of 88 degrees. Sullivan's feat was performed in water at a temperature of 76 degrees.

SULLY AGAIN IN COTTON MARKET.

New York, Jan. 15.—Cotton traders are taking interest in a story which is circulating among them to the effect that Daniel J. Sully, who engineered the most gigantic cotton corner ever attempted some years ago and who led the biggest bull market the exchange ever saw until he failed for something like \$2,000,000, had again entered the market. The story is not confirmed, but is causing much comment.

COMMERCIAL CLEARING HOUSE.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—A plan for a "commercial clearing house"—an institution through which business houses could settle their debts and collect their bills among themselves without recourse to the banks—was launched last night at the meeting of the Chicago Credit Men's association. The proposal was enthusiastically received by representatives of 250 large business houses. A resolution was passed to appoint a special committee to make an investigation with a view to devising ways and means to put the plan into operation.

The plan is simply the adaptation of the "bankers' clearing house system" to the needs of mercantile affairs. Large mercantile houses would proceed at once to effect debtor and creditor settlements among themselves by the exchange of canceled checks, in a manner similar to the settlements made by banks, without the necessity for the exchange of real money.

These mercantile settlements would be made on the basis of the values of sound mercantile accounts.

BROWN AND BARNETT BEGIN FIGHT FOR LIBERTY

San Francisco, Jan. 15.—J. D. Brown and Walter J. Barnett, formerly general manager and vice-president, respectively, of the insolvent California Safe Deposit and Trust company, charged with embezzlement and alleged to be responsible for the wrecking of that institution, began their fight for liberty before Superior Judge Dunne this morning, by attacking the validity of the indictments returned against them, and met with their first defeat.

Atty. Hiram W. Johnson, on behalf of Brown, attacked the legality of the indictments, on statutory grounds which questioned the qualifications of the grand jury in this matter, because several members of it were depositors in the wrecked bank. He moved that the indictments be set aside on the ground that several grand jurors, as creditors, sat in judgment upon a debtor, and therefore could not act impartially, and were biased and prejudiced against the defendant.

Several members of the grand jury were called by Johnson, and testified to having lost money in the failure, and that while they held the office responsible for the failure, they were not biased or prejudiced in voting the indictments.

Asst. Dist. Atty. William Hoff Cook strenuously sought to shut off the line questioning followed by Johnson, but with one or two exceptions, was overruled by Judge Dunne.

Johnson, in addressing the court upon his action, declared that he was not, "When you take a man's money, you come pretty near touching his sentiments," and that he was not a debtor, but a creditor, and that several members were in the position of creditors and he was in the position of a debtor.

Johnson asked and was granted 20 days to the same time interposed a demurrer to the indictments. Oscar Cooper and the indictment by Atty. General, counsel for Barnett, also filed a general demurrer to the indictments against their client. The matter was then continued for one week.

Without making any corrective recommendations, he called attention to the fact that, with a single exception, the colliers chartered to accompany the fleet are foreign bottoms. American owners having declined to give even at the 50 per cent advance over foreign quotations which the government offered. The reason for their refusal was that American vessels could make more money by plying in the coastwise trade. The exception noted was the collier Virginia, whose owners gave a charter at a slight advance, because they purposed transferring the craft to the Pacific trade.

TO REGULATE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Senator Gore today introduced a bill providing that the interstate character of a shipment of liquor shall cease upon its arrival at the place with a view to its consumption, and making the shipment subject to local laws from that time on.

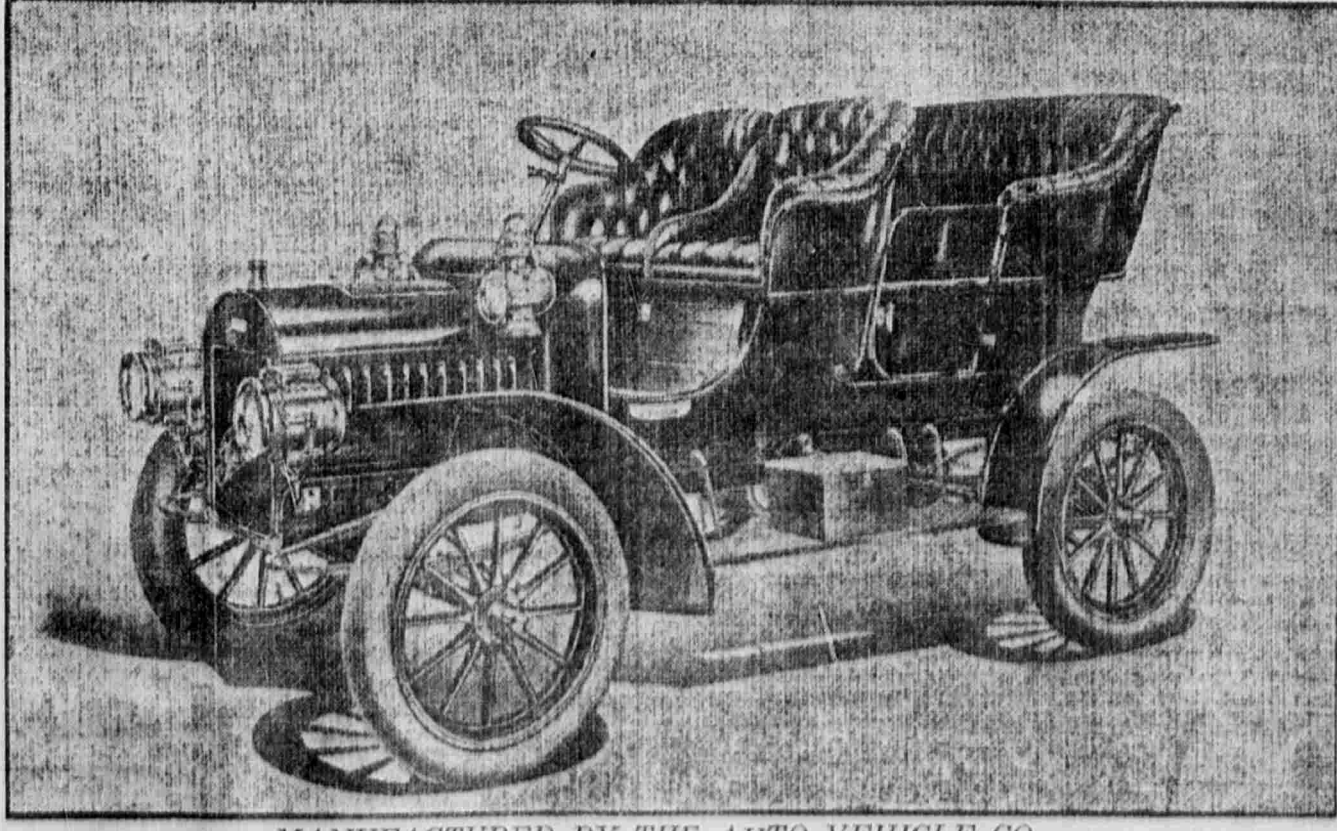
