LOCAL BRIEFS.

To Pass on Bids—The board of education meets at noon tomorrow to pass on the bids for the equipment of the high school gymnasium.

Admitted To Citizenship—J. C. Parsons of London, England, was admitted to citizenship today at the district court. He is now a full-fledged American.

Ferguson Arraigned—D. M. Ferguson, accused of assaulting a little girl, was arraigned before Judge Armstrong this morning and pleaded not guilty.

May Raise Broom Corn—J. C. Williams of Arcola, Ill., thinks of coming to this state to raise broom corn in the Salt Lake and Sanpete valleys, as he thinks the soil admirably adapted to its cultivation.

Cummings Loses a Sparkler—An unknown thief appropriated a valuable diamond shirt stud from the bath room of Prof. Horace Cummings the other day, while the savant was floating in the brine. He will have his valuables checked hereafter.

Prisoner Dies at St. Mark's—John Correy, arrested for vagrancy on the 20th inst., died yesterday at St. Mark's hospital. Correy was taken to jail in a weakened condition and a few days later was removed to the hospital where he remained until his death.

Death of a Boy—D. Lester Johnson, the 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. David K. Johnson of 1301 Tenth Street, died Monday morning at 6:30 o'clock from a heart disease. The funeral services were held from the residence this morning.

First Ward—A splendid program has been arranged for Friday night, the first ward assembly hall as a mark of esteem for Elder M. F. Eakle who has been called to fill a mission in the Sandwich Islands. He will leave Salt Lake for his field of labor on Sunday next.

New Shoe Company—The Harding Shoe company was incorporated and the papers filed with the county clerk this morning. H. A. Harding is president; Grace C. Harding, vice president; and J. F. Harding, secretary and treasurer. It is incorporated for \$25,000.

Incorrigible Girl—A complaint was sworn to before Justice of the Peace shop this morning charging Hazel Peterson of Bingham with incorrigibility. The girl accordingly will be given a chance to show cause why she should not be sent to the reform school.

Parley P. Christensen Returns—Parley P. Christensen, who had the proud distinction of having his photograph in the Denver Post last week and his name spelled wrong, returned from Denver this morning where he had been attending the festivities incident to purple week.

Utah County Fair—The Utah County fair association of Provo filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state this morning. The capital stock is placed at \$50,000, the par value of the shares being \$1. The president of the fair is R. R. Irvine with E. E. Hinkley, vice president; Joseph T. Fawcett, treasurer; and Julius C. Anderson, secretary.

Presented to Calder's—An American flag was yesterday presented by Miss Helena Obid to the management of Calder's park, and the flag was placed in a conspicuous place, after a speech of acceptance by Manager Ed McLelland. The flag is the handiwork of the young lady in appreciation of the public generally and of the officials of the park in particular.

Grass Fire—Grass fires in the northwest part of the city necessitated a long run by the fire department yesterday. The flames covered a large acreage and it was with great difficulty that they were subdued. Residences in that section were at times in imminent danger of being reached by the blaze, and the people were alert to save their property should the fire come too close.

Succumbed to Injuries—While working in a cut on the Yellowstone extension of the Oregon Short Line, Von Koski, a native of Finland, was injured by a cave-in on Monday last. He was brought to St. Mark's hospital for treatment, but he was fatally hurt and died yesterday. The remains are at Evans' undertaking establishment, awaiting funeral arrangements by friends in this city. The deceased was 35 years old.

Going to Lake Geneva—Secy. F. J. Lucas of the boys' department of the Y. M. C. A., Allen Endley of the high school class, and Lawrence Mangum of the business class, will leave Saturday for Lake Geneva, Wis., to attend the second annual boys' conference of associations all over the country. They will be away for two weeks, and carry with them a large white and blue flag with "Salt Lake City Y. M. C. A." thereon, and white sweaters with "Utah" in blue letters across the front.

Lost Children Tent—A "lost children" tent was provided yesterday at Liberty park, no numerous were the cases of little ones who strayed away from their parents and protectors. The plan worked admirably, and during the day no less than 25 tents were cared for at the tent, until claimed by anxious searchers. It soon became known among the people who spent the day in the park that a general headquarters was established for children who had wandered away, and the action of the officers who inaugurated the happy scheme was duly appreciated.

Went Under at Saltair—Miss Ethel Byers of Keokuk, Ia., had a very unpleasant experience at Saltair yesterday while bathing. She was floating in about four feet of water when she attempted to stand on the bottom. During the process she lost control of herself and her head went under and she remained with her face under water for several seconds until her rescuers came to her aid. As she had swallowed some water she nearly strangled before the bath houses were reached. She was finally resuscitated.

BELL BOY GANG FROM SALT LAKE

Smooth Lot of Sneak Thieves
Run Down by Denver
Detectives.

ROBBED THE VISITING ELKS.

More Than \$1,000 of Property Stolen
Recovered From the Rooms of
Young Reprobates.

Eight members of what the detectives believe is one of the boldest and best organized gangs of sneak thieves who have ever operated in this section of the country have been arrested and all will be sent to the state reformatory at Buena Vista, before many days, says the Denver Post.

All members of the band are under 20 years of age, and without exception committed their thefts under the disguise of bellboys in the different hotels of the city while the Elks were here last week. Most of their loot has been recovered by Captain of Detectives Loomis and his men, and at present the safe in Capt. Loomis' office contains more than \$1,000 worth of clothing, underwear, jewelry, etc.

Of the eight members of the gang three were arrested last Thursday at the St. James hotel. They were Clarence Bangs, Joseph Ellis and Ralph Miller, and they, pleading guilty, were sent to Buena Vista. The five other members, arrested yesterday afternoon and last night, are Gustav Nostrom, Edward Mangie, Frank Lafrey, James Wade and John Carroll. Nostrom, who is known among them as the "Big Swede," and who is 20 years of age, is said to be the leader and organizer of the gang. He claims to be from Salt Lake City, which others of the gang also claim as their home. The rest came here from California for the Elks' reunion.

The arrest of the five thieves yesterday was effected by Detectives Rinker, Brown, Green and Sparhawk. Rinker observed Wade and Carroll as they were engaged in carrying three suitcases into a house at Fifteenth and Larimer streets. He watched them as they went to a room at 126 Curtis street and returned with two more suitcases and again went to the first mentioned house. He notified his colleagues and together the officers swooped down upon the Larimer street house. Wade and Carroll were found together in a room, which resembled more a second-hand store than a living room. Piled high there the officers found nearly all the stuff which had been reported stolen from visiting Elks during reunion week. They made a full confession and gave the names of other members of the gang and the places where they could be found. In the course of a few hours Rinker, Brown, Sparhawk and Green had succeeded in finding and arresting Lafrey, Mangie and Nostrom, "the Big Swede."

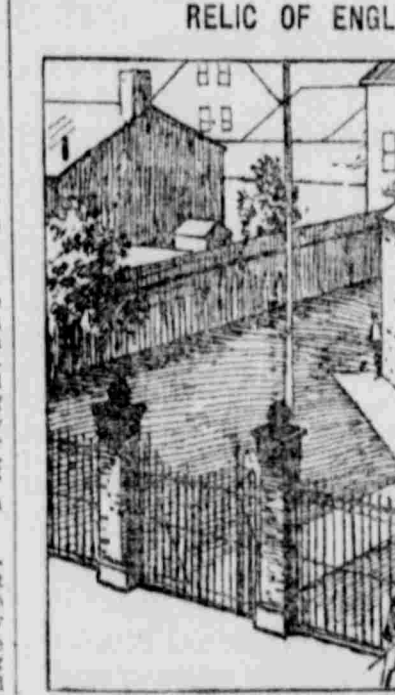
Nothing is known here about the past life of the boys except that they are from Salt Lake City or California, and that they were bellboys. Like experienced criminals they refuse to give the detectives any information which might help in the work of restoring the stolen property to their rightful owners. This work of restoration will, in some cases, be extremely difficult, as a number of thefts were never reported at headquarters, and the owners have left the city since the close of the reunion. Only a part of the stolen stuff is marked, and hence absolutely no marks which would lead to the discovery of the owners.

limitless boundary. This man was Heber C. Kimball, grandson of that great Mormon leader of that name. Death resulted from general debility caused by a long illness contracted some years ago while in the mission field.

The deceased leaves a loving and devoted wife and two small children to mourn his demise. He was born July 15, 1873. His parents are Albert H. and Hattie Partridge Kimball. The young man's father was in Idaho at the time of his death and was located after considerable difficulty last night. He will be home tomorrow evening, and the funeral will probably be held on Friday.

The unfortunate young man filled a mission to the Southern States and loyalty and goodly endeavor were interwoven in his every act. He was loved by all who knew him and his death will be a crushing blow to his family.
