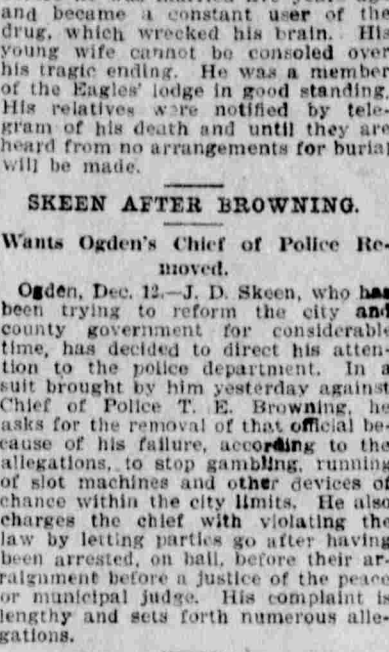

SKREEN AFTER BROWNING.

Wants Ogden's Chief of Police Removed.

Ogden, Dec. 12.—J. D. Skreen, who has been trying to reform the city and county government for considerable time, has decided to direct his attention to the police department. In a suit brought by him yesterday against Chief of Police T. E. Browning, he asks for the removal of that official because of his failure, according to the allegations, to stop gambling, running of slot machines and other devices of chance within the city limits, and to charge the chief with violating the law by letting parties go after having been arrested, on bail, before their arraignment, before a justice of the peace or municipal judge, with out any length and sets forth numerous allegations.

WANTS COAL FOR ELY.

D. W. Ellis, Formerly of Ogden, Now A Resident of Nevada. Ogden, Dec. 12.—Daniel W. Ellis, former county recorder of Weber county, but now a resident of Nevada, and real estate dealer at Ely, Nevada, is in Ogden for a few days in company with his partner, Lieut. Gov. Decker, and Thomas O'Neill. He stated that Nevada is in fact one of the towns of Ely and Goldfield are having a land boom. Dr. Davis has been a resident practicing dentist here for a great many years and had also an office in Grantsville. His wife, for whom a great deal of sympathy is felt, has three small children and is very respectably connected, being a daughter of William Rydick of Grantsville. A warrant is out for the arrest of the doctor, but so far the officers have failed to locate him. He is known to have left here on Saturday by the early morning train and is reported to have been seen in Salt Lake on that day.
