**Celebration at Kaysville.**—An interesting event to those concerned (and that is a large circle) took place on the evening of the 8th inst., at the thriving town of Kaysville. The family and friends of ex-Bishop now President C. Layton, celebrated his 50th birthday by assembling together and engaging in such exercises as were calculated to make the occasion memorable.

The proceedings were commenced by the presentation of an elegantly gold mounted ebony walking cane, on which was inscribed the following: "Presented to President C. Layton, by his children and grandchildren," with the date. Mrs. Wm. Galbraith, (the Bishop's oldest daughter) then presented a very fine piece of illuminated pen-work, executed by Professor A. J. Phelps, of Bountiful, and beautifully mounted and framed; this was a copy of the Patriarchal blessing as given in Nauvoo, to Brother L. by the Patriarch Hyrum Smith.

President Layton made in response, a short speech, full of feeling and good counsel, then blessing his family, and warmly exhorted them to faithfulness and devotion to the great latter-day work. There were present 41 of his children and 30 grandchildren, besides other members of his family and friends, in number over one hundred, who sat down to a bountiful supper. Meanwhile the brass band of Kaysville serenaded the party.

Supper dispatched, singing, music, games and conversation made the hours fly past, until at 1 a. m., in groups each branch of the family and friends wended their way homeward, hoping that many long years may yet fall to the Patriarch, the Father, the Bishop, the President and friend. Next morning the surplus of the feast found its way to homes where delicacies found a welcome.
