Provided ion and state government: Provided tion and state government: Provided, the constitution and government so to be formed, shall be republican, and in conformity to the principles contained in these articles; and so far as it can be consistent with the general interest of the confederacy, such admission shall be allowed at an earlier period, and when there may be a less number of free inhabitants in the state than sixty thousand."

A BILL To incorporate the Utah Railroad Mining and Land Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That James Edward McConnel, Lieutenant Colonei Richard Bateson, Sir Thomas Bateson, baronet, member of parlia-ment, Samuel Stephen Bateson, Acton Tindal, Arthur Bott Cook, John Edward Bartlett, and Arthur Bruce Frazer, and such other persons as may be associated with them and their suc cessors, are hereby created a body poli-tic and corporate in the Territory of Utah and adjoining Territories, by the name, style, and title of the Utah Rail-

road Mining and Land Company, and by that name shall have succession and shall be able to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, defend and be de-fended in all proper courts of law and equity, and may make and have a com-

mon seal. Sec. 2 That the capital stock of the said corporation shall be five million dollars, divided into shares of one hun-

dred dollars each, and the same shall be deemed to be personal property and transferable on the books of the company only; and such capital stock may be increased from time to time to the extent necessary to carry out the objects for which the said company is formed, not exceeding in the whole the sum of twenty-five million dollars, upon a vote of two-thirds proxy in amount of the stock for the time being in favor of such increase.

Bec. 3. That the said company shall have power to make such by-laws as it deems proper for the disposition of its property and estate, and for the man-agement of its business and affairs, for agement of its business and affairs, for the regulation of the term of office of its officers and their duties, and to carry out the general objects of the corpora-tion, and the same to amend or repeal at pleasure: *Provided*, That such by-laws shall not conflict with any law of the United States, or of any of the Territories thereof or States which may be formed therein.
