San Francisco Hunting for the Republican Convention of '00.

LET'S SIX MONTHS FOR A HAZARD.

Immigration Convention—Shooting and the Marriage—Died from Lock-Jaw—General Items.

William Dwyer, aged 19, is the youngest inmate of the House of Correction. He is serving a six months term for stealing a razor.

Tuesday's big receipts in Omaha were for the first time over \$100,000. There were 57 cars of grain, 1,170 head of cattle and 1,000 head of horses.

The Alameda, Cal., best sugar factory will start December 1. Up to the present there and the 7,000 tons of sugar have been produced. This season.

Frederick Williams, an aged man, was run into by a stagecoach last Thursday, and died the following Monday. The accident occurred after the accident, so that now he cannot be buried.

In consequence of the husband of Mrs. Louis Kern, of San Francisco, having refused to let his wife wear a necklace and ring a bracelet, Mrs. Kern has secured a divorce on the ground of cruelty.

James Thompson, a Mexican war veteran who left Ogden, Utah, on Saturday on the Southern Pacific train, left from the platform between Russell and Rockville, Cal., on Sunday, and received fatal injuries.

The proposition to issue \$50,000 bonds for paving the city's streets has been defeated by the voters of El Paso, Tex. The city only had a nominal indebtedness of \$75,000, but the taxpayers refused to issue a new bond.

Charlotte Shubert, of San Francisco, is suing her husband for divorce because he drank every day a gallon of alcohol, and while under the influence of liquor abused his wife by calling her a slut, a cow, a cat, a scoundrel and other such names.

The Commercial club, of St. Paul, Minn., has called an immigration convention to meet in that city on Monday, November 19th, to continue for three days. A representation of immigration has been asked from Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

Dennis O'Keefe, aged 15 years, died in Oakland, Cal., on Saturday, from lockjaw. The boy broke a pig-stick in his left hand a week ago while carrying wood, and though he was treated and nursed with the greatest care, the effects of the peculiarly painful affliction were so severe that he could not be stopped.

Tom Myers, the cowboy who was shot at Powder river last week, in the northern part of Wyoming, while attempting to escape with the 1-year-old daughter of Josephson, is rapidly recovering from his wound, inflicted by him to be father-in-law. The affair promises to have a peculiar termination, as Mr. Myers has agreed to his marriage to the girl and the wedding will take place as soon as Myers has fully recovered from his wounds. Proceedings, which had been commenced against Mr. Myers for the shooting, have been discontinued.

Professor Charles Gilbert, head of the zoology department at the Michigan university, Cal., will lead an expedition to Panama to make some collection of marine animals. The party will consist of three or four students in zoology. The expedition is under the auspices of Timothy H. Hays. The party will start December 1st and will be gone two months. About a year ago Mr. Jordan headed a similar expedition, which was extremely fortunate in its results. Many rare specimens were obtained, and many others being sent to other universities.

There is to be a mass meeting next Monday afternoon, November 5, at 2 o'clock, in the chamber of commerce hall, San Francisco, when the chief officials of the city government and members of all the commercial organizations and bodies of the city will meet to discuss ways and means to secure the Republican National convention for San Francisco. The following states and territories are expected to vote solidly in favor of the western location for the convention when the matter comes up before the National committee: Alaska, Arizona, Washington, Oregon, California, Montana, Wyoming, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Dakota, North Dakota and Indian Territory—sixteen votes, from the Western States, Connecticut and Iowa, from east of the Missouri river—eleven in all.
