SUGAR PLANT ASSURED. Beet Growing Contracts Signed -District Court Business.

Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 8 .- George Austin, agricultural superintendent, and Heber Austin, field superintendent, of the Utah Sugar company, met with the beet growers of Provo and the sur-rounding country yesterday in the First ward social hall, for the purpose of entering into contracts for beets for this year. There was a large attend-ance of farmers, and contracts were en-

tered into for the number of acres promised by the farmers to the can-vassing committee which has visited them during the past two months. To-day the Messrs. Austin will visit Lake View for the purpose of making con-tracts. The total acreage subscribed tracts. by farmers who will deliver to the

Provo cutting station is 1,030. The representatives of the sugar company addressed the meeting giving instructions as to the cultivation and care of beet crops, explaining the terms of the contract, etc.

SMALLPOX SITUATION.

Quarantine Raised too Soon-Another Outbreak - Schools Open.

Special Correspondence. Beaver City, Beaver County, Feb. 7.-The efforts of the board of health in this city to control the spread of small-pox have proved futile.
