## AMERICAN.

DALLAS, Texas, 20.—Capt. Payne of Oklahoma notoriety, who was arrested August 29th, for trespassing on Indian Territory lands, and has been in custody at Fort Reno, passed through here to day en route for Fort Smith, Arkansas, where he will be tried in the federal court. Payne was accompanied by his wife and child and eleven followers, in charge of Lieut. Taylor and a squad of soldiers of the Ninth Cavalry. When they reached Henrietta, Texas, yesterday, Payne swore out a writ of habeas corpus for himself and followers in the District Court, but Taylor refused to recognize it, whereupon a warrant was issued for the arrest of Taylor himself. This was also resisted, the civil officer not being permitted to enter the car.

PITTSBURG, 20.—Following is the result of the amalgamated Iron and Steel Association district meetings to-day, at Pittsburgh, Wheeling and Youngstown, on the question of rescinding the demand for an advance and accepting the old rates: Pittsburgh 81 for, 21 against; Youngstown 48 for, 8 against; Wheeling 17 for 18 against; total 114 for, 53 against. This virtually ends the strike which has lasted 116 days. The estimated loss to the men in wages is between \$3,000,000 and \$10,000,000, while that to manufacturers is only their contract.

The executive committee of the Iron Manufacturers' Association and representatives of the Amalgamated Association met this afternoon, and upon the presentation of the old scale by the latter it was signed by the manufacturers. The fires will be lighted immediately.

NEW YORK, 30.—A Times Washington special says: The growing impression about the cause of the President's visit to this city is that he has come in order that a respectable distance may lie between him and New York State till the republican convention shall have completed its work.

OMAHA, 20.—Daniel Wrangle and John Keyser, laborers this afternoon found a bottle in an old house, and, supposing it to contain whisky, drank the contents, which proved to be bedbug poison. Wrangle died in one hour, and Keyser is in a dangerous condition.

PHILADELPHIA, 20.—The trial of Thomas A. McDewitt, Benjamin Wiley, Christian Price and H. L. Grandens charged with conspiracy to defraud the government in Star route mail contracts, was begun in the United States District Court this morning.

KEOKUK, Iowa, 20.—W. F. Russell and Geo. Turbune, counterfeiters, were arrested at Albia and brought to this city to-day. Counterfeit nickels and dimes for their manufacture were captured in their possession.

PETERSON, N. J., 20.—Mrs. Sarah Story was sent to jail here on the charge of murdering by poison Mrs. Elizabeth Fleet. Mr. Story is suspected of poisoning her husband and also another woman.

MINNEAPOLIS, 20.—There was a sharp frost throughout the State last night. Corn is half in shock and most of the balance beyond the reach of harm. Vines were cut down, but the loss from this source is not serious.

SAN FRANCISCO, 21.—A Victoria dispatch says: The royal party landed from the *Comus* at E-quimalt at seven o'clock; the sailors manning the yards, bands playing, batteries saluting and populace cheering. They were received by the Lieut. Governor, who read an address of welcome. They were then escorted to Victoria by several hundred citizens formed of military and benevolent societies. At the city gates the mayor presented them with the freedom of the city and an address. On reaching the grand stand 500 children sang the national anthem, and another address was presented. Replies were given by the Marquis. As the carriage passed along the streets to the Government House the occupants were repeatedly cheered. All the houses and stores along the line of march were decorated. A Chinese arch 40 feet high and shaped like a pagoda spanned Store St. The ornamentation cost several thousand dollars. The mail steamship *Dakota* and U. S. steamer *Oiver Wolcott*, lying in port, were decked in American colors. To night the city will be brilliantly illuminated.

NEW YORK, 21.—The mining firm of James G. Sands & Co. is announced to have failed. The firm did a large business with down-town business men, and with society people up town who dabbled in mining stocks. Sands is reported gone to San Francisco to attend the development of several Mexican mines. He was secretary of several mining companies. It is not known where his partner, C. R. Callaban has gone. Among inquiring customers were two society ladies who contributed \$210,000 each to a pool, out of which they realized \$60,000; all the rest is said to be left on the hands of the firm for future contemplated speculations on a larger scale. An up-town crockery merchant and several prominent lawyers are said to have left each about ten thousand dollars in the vaults of the firm before the members disappeared. A large number of people deposited between one thousand and five thousand with the missing brokers as margins. Neither of the firm has been seen since the 11th inst. It is stated that the sheriff seized what effects could be found.

LOCHINE, Ont., 21.—The boiler of the ferry steamer *Richelieu* exploded this morning and killed Duane the pilot, James Richardson and Persellus Amyot of Chateauguay, farmers, and Duquette, son of the pilot is missing—supposed to have been blown overboard.

## WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

THE DECISION OF HON. F. H. EMERSON, OF THE FIRST DISTRICT COURT.

This is an application by the plaintiff, Lucy S. Anderson, for a writ of mandamus against the defendants, who are respectively Chief Registrar and Deputy Registrar for the County of Weber, to compel them to administer to her the oath prescribed by the Commissioners of Election and register her name among the legal voters of Ogden precinct, in said county.

The petition recites that the plaintiff is a native born citizen of the United States, over the age of 21 years, and has resided in this Territory for more than six months last past, and in the precinct of Ogden for more than one month immediately preceding the time of offering herself for registration as a legal voter in said precinct, and that the defendants refused to administer the oath to her and to register her name among the legal voters of said precinct, upon the ground that she was a female and not entitled to vote.

At the time the petition was presented to me, the defendants appeared by counsel and demurred to it, the counsel for both parties stating that by the petition and demurrer they desired to raise and have decided the sole question of the validity of the Act of the Territorial Legislature of 1870, conferring upon females the right of suffrage; that the defendants based their right to refuse to register the plaintiff upon the ground that the Act mentioned was void.

I should have been much better satisfied if I could have given more time to the consideration of this question. The arguments of counsel were closed on Thursday evening. On yesterday (Friday) my attention was occupied by other matters in court, and the present term of court closes to-day; hence I must content myself with these hastily prepared reasons for the decision I am about to make.

The Act in question was approved February 12, 1870, and is as follows: "Every woman of the age of 21 years who has resided in this Territory six months next preceding any general or special election, born or naturalized in the United States, or who is the wife, widow or daughter of a native born or naturalized citizen of the United States, shall be entitled to vote at any election in this Territory."

S. c. 2. "All laws or parts of laws conflicting with this act are hereby repealed."

The qualification of electors previous to the passage of this act is found in section 3 of "An Act prescribing certain qualifications necessary to enable a person to be eligible to hold office, vote, or serve as a juror," passed in 1859, as amended in 1868, and is as follows: "neither shall any person be entitled to hold any office of trust or profit in this Territory, or vote at any election unless he is a male citizen of the United States over 21 years of age, and has been a constant resident of the Territory during the six months next preceding said election or appointment."

Sec. 6. "No person shall be deemed a resident within the meaning of this Act, unless he is a taxpayer in this Territory."

Section 5 of the Organic Act, in force when both the above-mentioned acts were passed, provided: "That every free white male inhabitant, above the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of said Territory at the time of the passage of this Act shall be entitled to vote at first the election, and shall be eligible to office within the said Territory; but the qualifications of voters and of holding office at all subsequent elections shall be such as shall be prescribed by the Legislative Assembly: Provided, That the right of suffrage and of holding office shall be exercised only by citizens of the United States, including those recognized as citizens by the treaty with the Republic of Mexico, concluded February 2d, 1848."

It is claimed that in passing the act of 1870 conferring the elective franchise upon women the Territorial Legislature exceeded the power conferred upon it by the above quoted section of the Organic Act, by attempting to confer the right to vote upon a class not named in the first part of the quoted section, which names the qualified voters at the first election under said Act. Section 6 of the Organic Act provided that the legislative power of
