LAST NIGHT'S COUNCIL BUSINESS.

The City council at a regular meeting
on Wednesday evening voted to increase
the Board of Education's budget by \$10,000.The first proposal made by the city
council last night was the reduction of
the city school tax, which the Council
voted down, but the increase of
\$10,000 to the Board of Education.The committee on schools, which
the mayor has formed, will investigate
the effect of the Board of Education
and Board of Education and others in
paying more money for, and the conse-
quent increased work connected
with the payment of increased taxes.C. T. Wollaston and others were
given permission to inspect the Great
Pavilion with the Mayor on Friday
week.The matter of the construction of a
new or front avenue was referred to
the city attorney for an opinion as to
whether the property on that street
would be taxed if it were a private
thoroughfare.The city engineer reported that
present law did not permit the
construction of a new or front avenue
in the description of the street.Major Gossling was instructed
to ascertain the cost of a sidewalk
paved with stone and contract
for the paving of that thoroughfare.The Mayor was also instructed to
ask the Board of Public Works to
have a sidewalk built to be used by the
deaf.The committee on streets recom-
mended the construction of a new
sidewalk on Main Street, and
the Board of Education recommended
that the board of public works be
authorized to select bids and contract
for the construction of the new street.City Auditor Egan was instructed
to furnish a bill of estimate for
the paving of West Second Street.An ordinance authorizing
the paving of West Second Street
was passed.
