Of course, we found the catch pushed over and it seemed an hour before I got it open. All the time the headlight of the approach-ing engine looked like a mountain as it came closer. I got the door open at last and jumped a fraction of a second ne-fore the collision. The engine simply plowed through the caboose and one side of it fell within a few inches of my heels as I jumped.
