

# HARRIMAN MERGER SUIT ENDS HERE

Further Hearings Will be Held in  
Portland, San Francisco  
And Los Angeles.

The taking of testimony in the suit brought by the government to dissolve the merger of the Harriman lines, so far as the Salt Lake and is concerned, was completed yesterday afternoon. Special Examiner Sylvester G. Williams, before whom the hearing was held, C. A. Sovereign, who conducted the examination as representative of A.T.P.-Gen. Wickham of the United States, and the counsel for the Harriman lines, left last night for Portland, Oregon, where the hearing will be continued next Monday. After the Portland session the court will go to San Francisco, where more testimony will be taken, and adjournment will then be taken to Los Angeles, where probably the final session of the hearing so far as the government side is concerned will be held. The defense will then be at liberty to go to such places and submit such testimony as it desires, after which the transcript of testimony will be prepared and the case argued on the evidence before some United States judge, perhaps in the district of Utah, where the proceedings began over a year ago.

**MCCARTHY RECALLED.**  
At the closing session of the hearing yesterday, W. S. McCarthy was recalled to testify as to the duration of the 52-hour freight train schedule between Omaha and Ogden. The witness said to his knowledge the train was maintained for several years, and that the schedule was generally made during that time.

J. G. McDonald, the well known chocolate manufacturer, occupied the stand for half an hour. He demonstrated by figures that it was cheaper for him to ship his cocoa beans from the Atlantic seaboard to California and then re-ship to Salt Lake than to ship direct to Salt Lake from the eastern seaboard.

Judge Lovett for the defense stated that the railroads had recently put in a reduced rate on cocoa beans, on which Mr. McDonald had not been informed.

Stephen H. Love was recalled to produce some figures substantiating a statement made by him that rates out of Salt Lake for a distance of 200 miles were much higher than rates out of Denver for a similar distance. The table submitted by Mr. Love showed that the Denver rate for such distance was \$3.80 per ton, while the Salt Lake rate is \$12.24 on the same class of commodity.

Lumber company, Orson Romney, manager of the George Romney Lumber company, George E. Merrill, of the Morrison Merrill Lumber company, and F. S. Murphy, wholesale dealer in lumber, testified as to the shipment of lumber into the Nevada territory. Most of the lumber supply for this section comes from Oregon, and the rate was raised 5 cents per 100 pounds via the Shasta route, over the former price of 40 cents made by the O. R. & N. and Oregon Short Line roads.

Judge C. C. Goodwin was called to the witness stand, and testified that he was present at a dinner given in honor of Senator W. A. Clark, in connection with the building of the Salt Lake route, and that the senator stated that the board was to be entirely independent.

Mr. Bahrhoff, while subpoenaed as a witness, was not placed on the stand. Many others summoned to testify were also passed over, owing to the limited time allotted to the Salt Lake hearing. The hearing then adjourned until Monday, when it will be resumed at Portland.

## FROST NIPS UTAH FRUIT.

At Modena the thermometer registered a minimum of 25, while at Pocatello it was 18 degrees. At Lauder, Wyo., it was 6 degrees above zero, and at Denver, the mercury fell to 18 degrees, and at Helena it was 12 degrees. Owing to the prevalence of a high barometer, the weather office promises fair weather for tonight and tomorrow, but with another frost tonight.

The storm which overpread the country yesterday is central this morning over the upper lake region, and has caused general rain or snow over the Rocky mountains eastward to the Atlantic coast. An extensive area of high pressure covers the states from the Rockies to the Pacific coast, and is attended by freezing weather over the plateau and Rocky mountain regions.

The effects of the cold snap in this section are believed to be far reaching. A number of commission and produce men on the street estimating that the damage may reach half a million of dollars, the heaviest losses being in peaches of which, up to yesterday, promised to yield a very large crop. One millinery grocer who expected to pack 10,000 cases this season, thinks he will now have to be content with 1,000.

Edward Brady, who owns a five-acre peach orchard near Mill Creek, believes his losses will amount to \$1,000—quite a sum for him. A. H. Vogeler found the buds and blossoms in his yard peach trees this morning, all blackened, and examination of shrubbery about town showed similar conditions. Fear was felt for the strawberry beds extending down the east sides of the Wasatch mountains; but growers say the snow had the plants covered up so that the frost did not get at them, and the berry crop is safe up to date.

## SHEEP IN BAD WAY.

At the headquarters of the Utah Wool Growers' association this afternoon, it was not believed that there would be much loss among the newly shorn sheep. The extreme length of the present winter season is being commented upon, as the first snow began falling early in last October, and it snowed all day yesterday, the 25th of April. Ice an inch thick was found in pails and tubs this morning about town. In Park City, reports came of a two feet snowfall, and at the Wasatch planting station of the forest service, the depth of the snow is reported at 7 feet. This season is now being referred to as two winters in one.

The length has made many of the necessities of life scarce here, and the planting season is being deferred. Resort managers are shaking their heads at the dubious prospect, remembering the disastrous experience of last year at opening time—cold and rainy, with warm weather not arriving until the middle of June. The precipitation for the storm just closed amounted to one-third of an inch of rain. At the same time the cold snap has frozen up the melting snows in the mountains, so that there ought not to be any recurrence of flood epidemics for a week to come.

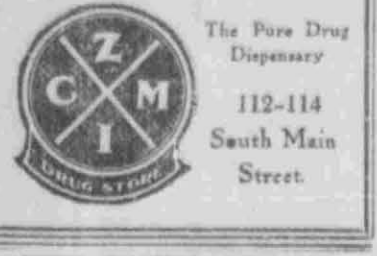

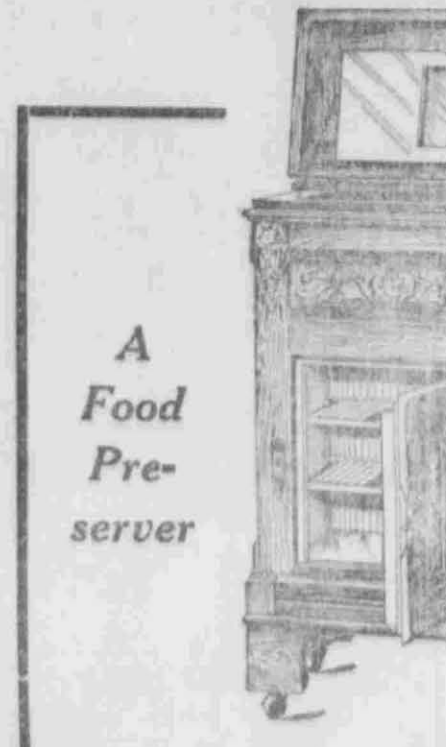
