### E, H. HARRIMAN IS COMING WEST

Railroad Magnata is Scheduled To Visit Utah in the Near Future.

TO LOOK OVER PROPOSITION.

Salt Lake Route Troubles, Salton Sea. Saft Lake Depot and Other Matters Claim Attention.

Advices from the east are to the effect that E. H. Harriman, magnate, is coming west on a visit to look over his various properties and interests extending from one coast to the other. None of the Harriman interests profess to know anything about their chief's plans, but it is understood that he will arrive here on his way to California some time during the latter part

he will arrive here on his way to California some time during the latter part of the present month.

Why should Harriman come west? Well, it is quite generally known that he is interested in the well being and smooth running of the Salt Lake Rotte through the Meadow Valley Wash and further toward Los Angeles; also the washouts and repairing of them on the line of the Southern Pacific in Cartfornia; and in the land and water involved in the great Salton sea proposition, which now presents the problem of how to control the land instead of the water, as it is said great fissures are appearing in the land from which the waters were diverted, and all this country is controlled by the Southern Pacific railroad. The matter of the building of the new depot in Salt Lake may also receive a passing notice at the magnato's hands, as well as the proposed new union station in Los Angeles, operations on which were broken off at the time of the earthquake in San Francisco a year ago. The building of that stricken city may also take up some of his time, and taking everything into consideration, Mr. Harriman might find enough doing out west to keep him busy for a few days, even if he didn't want to get out of the strenuous life for a brief breathing spell among the mountains and plains of the great westerr country. Politics will not, it is averred, enter into his coastward trip. The last time Mr. Harriman came west was exactly a year ago, when he made his record trip across the continent following the San Francisco dispater. He is now due to make his annual trip of inspection.

Issuillia threatened to kill the cusign if he did not desist in his purpose of landing marines. Commander Fulsam of the Marietta sent a body of marines ashore to demand an apology from Isnuilia. The marines found the colonel with eight men drawn up in skirmish line and were told that Col. Issuilla demanded an apology of the Americans. When, however, the Americans advanced, and said they intended to have an apology, Isauilla backed down and wrote one.

Among the acts for which an apology was asked was the culting down of a British flag at Salado. Isauilla's soldiers threatened the life of William Collins, a British subject, who had raised his flag for protection. Commander Fullam informed the colonel that the American marines would not allow insults to the British flag.

#### ITALIAN BANDIT WILL BE SENT BACK TO ITALY.

Washington, April 22.—Through the Italian consul general at New York, an investigation is being made into the case of the man said to be Enrico Alfano, an alleged bandit who escaped from Italy after, participating in the murder of one Cuccole, a pretender to the position of ruler of the Cammorral, and who was arrested in New York during a police raid on an Italian resort. The man is being held pending his identification.

At the Italian embassy here it was stated that if the man in custody is really Alfano, he is much sought by the Italian government, and that in all probability extradition will not be recessary because he is filegally in the United States as a criminal and could be deported as such.

New York, April 22.—Enrico Alfano, alleged leader in Italy of the secret and criminal Cammorrai society of Naples, who was arrested in this city last week during a police raid, today was turned over to the immigration authorities, by whom he will be deported to Italy. Alfano escaped from Italy shortly after the mysterious murder of one Cuccolo and Cuccolo's wife, crimes of which Alfano and other workers in the ranks of the Cammorral are accused. When Alfano was arrested he was brought into the Tombs court on the charge of murder. The case went over until today pending the arrival of legal documents from Italy, but meantime the Italian detectives in charge of the arrest were advised to submit the case to the immigration officials. The presiding judge considered it unlikely that Alfano could be held on the homicide complaint, in the absence of documents in evidence from abroad. The court's suggestion was followed.

In the Tombs court today the defendant was discharged on the murder complaint, but was immediately turned over to the federal authorities and removed to Ellis Island. Commissioner of Immigration Watchorn said he would be deported within a few days.
