EVENING NEWS.

CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council met in regular session at 7 o'clock last evening. Mayor Sharp presiding.

A petition from Sven Anderson and 28 others, dealers in hay, who are accustomed to have their hay weighed at the city scales, presented to the council.

George Mattison stated that he had obtained a lease, maturing in 1890, of 280 square rods, north and east of the Artesian Well; the purpose for which he had leased it (poultry farming) had not proved satisfactory, and he was asked to be released from the contract.

Frank Foote and J. C. Conklin & Co., proprietors of the Salt Lake Sampling and Urea Sampling Mills, drew attention to the fact that the license required of them, \$10 per annum, was excessive, and asked for its reduction. Referred to the committee on license.

Hyrum Groesbeck, administrator of the estate of Nicholas Groesbeck, stated that the Wasatch Bank had been assessed at \$7,000 prior to 1885. At the beginning of the year the county had placed the valuation at \$5,000, but he had appeared before the County Board of Equalization and had the amount reduced to \$3,000. Thinking that the city valuation would be from the county's corrected rolls, he had not thought it necessary to appear before the City Board of Equalization and as a consequence the city's valuation was \$10,000 greater than the county's. He directed attention to the fact that the city had been no improvement on the property, and that real estate was worth 20 percent more than it was a year ago.

THE FIRST DISTRICT COURT.

ORDER OF CITY, DEC. 15, 1885.

Court opened at 10 o'clock in the usual manner. A large

ARMY OF LEGAL LUMINARIES

was again in attendance to look after the interests of their clients.

The first business called was that of Lorenzo Snow, Judge Williams of the county for defense, asked for a little more time to prepare the demurrer, etc.

W. T. B. Gray, charged with procuring abortion, was arraigned and pleaded "not guilty." Trial set for Saturday, 18th inst.

The petit jury was excused until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, and the case of Jas. H. Nelson set for Dec. 20th, that of James Taylor for the same day, and Chas. F. Middleton's for the 30th.

The Keweenaw mining case was then resumed. (At this stage several parties arose and left the court-room, when the judge said a little tartly, "There are any other who wish to leave within the next two hours, they had better leave now.") This brief array was followed by a

GENERAL, SIMULTANEOUS EXODUS, and not more than twelve persons were left in the body of the hall (justice).

The case of John Stuart was next arraigned on a charge of violating the Edmunds act. He took the statutory oath to plead. He was then arraigned on a

"SEGREGATED" CHARGE

of the same character and took time to plead to it.

The case of Chas. W. Hemenway was continued till 10 o'clock a.m. Wednesday, and that of Lorenzo Snow at 12 noon of the same day.

This afternoon the grand jury came into court and presented one indictment under the territorial laws. The celebrated mining case consumed nearly all the remainder of the afternoon.

The weather has much moderated, the roads are muddy, and the city fathers continue the work of improvement, which is much needed in many parts of our fast-growing city.

COMMERCIAL BUSINESS

has again become active, and there is a visible improvement in that direction. There is, however, a lull in the shipping business, although the high prices of an immense amount of produce of every description sent out of the country during the fall. There is still a demand for Utah potatoes in the West.

One large firm in San Francisco has sent orders for a large shipment to be sent to the Bay city, where they will be distributed to various points in Arizona and other places. There is not, however, much advance in the price of grain or roots.

The decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Canon case took the great majority of the people here by surprise; although there are a few persons who say they expected no other. The expression of opinion upon learning these facts, coupled with the recent proceedings in the District Courts of this territory are various. Some are indignant, angry and outspoken; while others are stunned at the announcements, and their feelings appear to be

Others - a few - receive the news with stolid indifference, and a placidity of temper that seems to be entirely unaccountable. But the latter-day Salt Lake generally look at the bright side of everything, and hence they feel that these things will ultimately advance the interests and final deliverance of the "Mormon" community.

Heber C. Kimball used to say, "The rougher the way, the shorter the stay." And many here think that matters may be a little rougher for a time, but they are at the present time. However, they have concluded to wait and see.

Long before the hour announced, the large and capacious hall was packed to its utmost capacity, and shortly after 7 p.m., after an introduction by Elder W. W. Jackson, Prof. Tammage began his lecture on the bow of the earth, exhibiting as he went along, evidences of the infinite power and wisdom of the Creator in the formation of the different strata underlying his footstool.

Had it not been for the Professor's lucid explanation that the earth's crust is somewhere about 50 miles in thickness, his audience would undoubtedly have felt uneasy at the thought of sitting over such an enormous boiling cauldron as he described the center of the earth to be, however, his flight was confined to the falling of a stove pipe, which for a time interrupted this most excellent lecture, and convinced many of his hearers that fire was in greater proximity to them than that of which the lecturer spoke.

However, as illustrative of the power and efficacy of "object lessons," this exhibition rank: first among the many heretofore shown, and backed as it was by the flowing and expressive sayings of the exhibitor, it was one of the richest intellectual treats it has been the fortune to witness.

If Professor Tammage should favor the Territory throughout with a similar lecture and convince his audience, as he did this, that revelation and science look hand in hand on this platform, much good would be accomplished.

One pleasant feature of the lecture which impressed itself upon the audience, was the simple and unaffected and yet expressive way of the lecturer in riveting their attention.

The lecture was free and from it we draw the conclusion that the B. Y. Academy has produced, among other benefits, one of the best lecturers in the Territory.
