

He gave his name as Al-fred Pacha, and claimed to be a nephew of Asa Pacha, of Pennsyl-vania. He said that he was one of a party of pro-pectors on their way to the newly-discovered Ean Juan mines. When not more than fifty miles from Los Pinos, he said, he had been token ill, and while in that condition he had been deserted by his companions, who left him no rines. These were hard to ind, and in a day or two they found them-eelves on the point of starvation Roots were dug out of the frozen ground, and on these they subsisted for some days. But roots as a means of subsistence were found to be not that condition he had been deserted by his companions, who left him no provisions, but gave him a Win-chester rifle with which to kill game if he discovered any. He regained his health and started for Loe Pinos, where he arrived after several days of weary tramping, his only food being roots and a rabbit which he had killed. His story was believed, and he was taken in and kindly cared for. After remaining at the agency s. for woary to recuperate, he went to Saguache, which was then the nearest point to the agency and the most advanced of all the fron-tier towns.
