# CONVENTION MAY BOLT.

'Commoner" Has Support and His Fight Will be Carried Into Every District of the State.

St. Paul, Minn., March 3 .- The Dem-

ceratic state committee of Minnesota, this morning, after a bitter fight, adopted a resolution endorsing Gov, Johnson of Minnesota for the presidential nomination and recommending that he be nominated at the national convention at Denver next July. As the meeting of the committee was

resided over by Frank C. Day, priate secretary to the governor, and who voted for the Johnson resolution on every test and on the final ballot, the action of the committee this after-noon is held by political leaders as placing the governor formally in the race for the Democratic presidential nouning the nomination.

BRYAN MEN MAY BOLT.

BRYAN MEN MAY BOLT. The Johnson resolution was carried by a vote of 68 to 23, after the Bryan adherents had forced two test votes, on both of which they were defeated. The Bryan men insisted on a roll call on every vote, and gave notice in their specches on the original resolution that they would not be bound by the action of the state committee, but would make a fight throughout the state for a delegation from Minnesota to the na-tional convention instructed to support the nomination of Mr. Bryan. More-over, a meeting of Bryan adherents, held at the Ryan hotel immediately after the adjournment of the state com-mittee, formed a Bryan organization which purposes to carry the contest against Johnson into every precinct of the state. the state. They arrived too late, however, the entire Custer command having been annihi-lated by the Indians. Callan left the army 23 years ago, and since that time has been engaged in business here.
