When the cashier returned yesterday morning the money was gone. It was decided that the janitor was the only person who had a key to the bank at night, he should be arrested. Dr. A. L. Trevaski, vice president of the bank, made the information. Over the telephone Cashier Carroll denied that any money of the institu-tion was missing and was unable to ac-count for the fact that Jordan was in the county jail charged with having stolen between \$8,000 and \$9,000 of the bank's money.
