LOCAL BRIEFS.

Whooping Cough Prevalent.—According to reports to the state board of health, whooping cough is prevalent throughout the state. Quarantine is now required in the case of this disease.

Going to Mexico.—W. S. McCormick and P. J. Haggerty will leave next Tuesday on a trip to Mexico where they have extensive ranching interests in northern Chihuahua. They will visit the City of Mexico before returning north.

Board Meeting.—The meeting of the board of public works will be held next Monday night instead of Tuesday night, the regular date of meeting. The change was made for this time on account of Tuesday being election day.

John Montgomery Dead.—John Montgomery, an old timer of this state, died yesterday at Blackfoot, Idaho, where he has been living for some years. He came to Utah in 1871 and ran the Central hotel at Corinne, located at Blackfoot in 1879. Montgomery was 87 years old.

Navajo Legion.—Members of the association are respectfully requested by the family of our late comrade and brother, Joseph H. Gough, who was an Indian war veteran, to attend his funeral which will be held in the Twenty-second ward meetinghouse on Sunday, November 4, at 12 o'clock, noon.

After Three Boys.—Officers of the juvenile court are looking for three boys named Ernest Voelker, Michael Emmond and "Box" Smith, who are charged with tearing down the registration notice and list from in front of the registration office in the Second district near Twelfth South and Eighth East streets.

Last Sad Rites.—The funeral of Frederick D. Schneider was held yesterday afternoon, Bishop Brighton conducting the services. There were many floral tributes, and the pallbearers were members of the Assistant Fireman's union of which the deceased was a member. The interment was in the City cemetery.

Application For Water.—F. M. Lyman, Jr., filed application yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer, for 10 second feet of water to be taken from the Provo above the Heber City canal, and to be used through 5,000 horsepower machinery to generate power in Park City, Heber and Salt Lake. The Teller Power company asks for 10 second feet from the Provo river to generate power.

Page Bound Over.—C. J. Page, who impersonated an internal revenue collector and also forged the name of E. H. Callister to a check which he had fraudulently obtained from a Greek saloon keeper, was before commissioner Baldwin yesterday, for examination. He was held to the United States district court, under bond of \$500, which he was unable to provide. He is now occupying a cell at the county jail.

Italian Arrested.—An Italian named Tony Campana was arrested last night, charged with having stabbed with a stiletto, a fellow countryman, John Ruppe. The men quarreled in the Lone Star saloon on West Temple, and it is alleged that Campana seriously wounded his opponent in the arm. Campana was locked up, charged with assault and battery, and the wound of Ruppe was dressed by Asst. City Physician Paul.

Fire Destroys Meetinghouse.—By a special from Taber, Alberta, Canada, to the "News" it is learned that the Mormon meetinghouse at that place was completely destroyed by fire during the night of Oct. 31. The structure had but recently been completed, and the loss will amount to \$3,000, details as no insurance was carried. Details of the fire are lacking, further than the facts stated and the information that the blaze was entirely accidental.

Stabbed in the Face.—For resenting the action of a stranger who had robbed a man in a saloon Thursday night, James Montgomery was attacked last evening by the alleged thief and received a severe stab in the face. The affair took place on Commercial street near First South, and a crowd quickly gathered, and the slasher had fled, and he has not yet been apprehended. Montgomery is a foreman of construction work at Garfield. He gave a good description of his assailant and it is thought that the man will be captured.

B. W. SAINSBURY DEAD.

The End Came This Morning After Long and Serious Illness.

After a long and lingering illness Bice W. Sainsbury passed away this morning at 5:30 at the Latter-day Saints' hospital, heart trouble and dropsy being the cause of death. He was born in London, England, Nov. 17, 1851, and emigrated to Utah in 1870. In 1896 he filled an honorable mission to Great Britain, where he was the means of bringing many to a knowledge of the truth. A number of whom are now residents of this city.

For many years he was a member of the tabernacle choir, having a beautiful tenor voice, being with the choir at the World's fair Chicago, when they won the second prize. He was also a member of the Twentieth ward choir for many years prior to his sickness.

Mr. Sainsbury was a man full of faith and integrity. His home was ever open to the depressed and downcast, and emigrants to the city found in him a true friend who was always ready to assist them materially as well as with words of encouragement. He had a large circle of acquaintances, who, while extending their sympathies to the bereaved ones, will feel that it was a happy release for him. The funeral services will be held in the Twentieth ward Monday, Nov. 5, at 2 o'clock and the remains can be viewed from 1:30 to 2 p. m. at the meetinghouse.

Says the Statements Made by The Aged Hebrew Are Wholly Without Foundation.

ASSAILANT TO BE ARRESTED.

County Attorney Christensen Says He Will Have to Face Charge of Assault and Battery.

County Attorney Christensen stated this afternoon that the warrant that had been issued for the arrest of Robert Hanger, an employee of the infirmary, on complaint of Israel Liberman, an aged Hebrew inmate, would be served and that Hanger would have to answer for his alleged assault and battery. Readers of the "News" will recall the plaintiffs made by Liberman, who has a general grievance against the management of the poorhouse. His side of the story has been given to the public, and to the county attorney's office, which says he has cause for the position he has taken. It seems that the county commissioners hold an entirely opposite view and say that Liberman is a "chronic kicker." The "News" has no interest in the affair beyond publishing the facts in the case.

When Mr. Sabine was seen in relation to the matter this afternoon, he entered a general and specific denial of all the charges made by Liberman, declaring that there was not a particle of truth in any utterance against his conduct of the institution. Mr. Sabine further said that he had never at any time mistreated any inmate of the infirmary or overworked a single person since he had taken charge of the place. The matters that Liberman complains of are now under investigation by the board, and in a statement already made to that body say Chairman Wilson and Superintendent Sabine, Liberman declared that he had no fault to find with either or complaint to make regarding Mr. Sabine.

JUDGE DIEHL'S COURT.

Case of Battery in Which Piece of Lead Pipe Figured.

In the criminal division of the city court this morning, Boyd Francisco, a colored boy, pleaded guilty to a charge of carrying a concealed weapon. He was fined \$10, and not having the money, was led to jail. He inquired of the officer how long he must be imprisoned and when told that it would be 10 days, he ejaculated rather pitiously, "Hully gee!"

Charles Miller was assessed \$10 for having been drunk. He had a terrible black eye, and was asking the cause of the disfigurement. Judge Diehl was informed that it came from a fall, rather than from a fight.

George B. McDaniel, a blacksmith, and William Jensen, a bartender, were arraigned on charges of assault and battery upon the person of L. R. Frederickson, a barber. They pleaded not guilty, and the prosecution asked for a postponement of the case until Monday. Both defendants strongly protested against a delay, but the case went over. Assistant City Atty. P. J. Diehl said that a more serious charge, namely, attempted robbery, should have been filed against the accused, but the evidence would be more or less of a circumstantial character, hence the less serious complaint. Bonds were fixed in the sum of \$25 each.

Julius Frankel was found guilty of battery, the victim being Mrs. Rose Star, a neighbor, and he was fined \$25. Frankel is a tailor and the husband of the complaining witness is a shoemaker. Both families reside on the same house, 543 East Fourth street, and it seems there have been frequent quarrels over trivial matters. Finally Mrs. Star had Frankel arrested for striking her with a piece of lead pipe. Defendant's attorney gave notice of an appeal to the district court when the penalty was imposed today.
