WELLS, FARGO'S COACH ROBBED AGAIN.

The Gold Hill (Nev.) News, of last Wednesday, says at three o'clock that morning one of Wells, Fargo's & Co's coaches, en route from Reno to Virginia, was stopped by highwaymen, when five miles from the former place, and robbed of \$1,200 in coin. The News says as it, (the coach), drove up by the old water tank, two men rushed out from behind it, one of them holding up a rail across the road in front of the horses, causing them to stop, the leaders doubling back upon the wheels, while the other man presented a shot-gun at the driver, saying: "Pass out that treasure box, quick."

Ned complied with the order, drawing it out of the boot, with the remark: "You'll have to get up here and take it; I've got to look out for my horses." Meanwhile the other rascal had laid down his rail, and stood beside the coach with his shot-gun pointed ready to fire. The passengers were informed that any one making the least resistance would be summarily shot; so they kept quiet. There were seven persons inside and two outside. The principal ruffian was a huge, stout, healthy fellow, wearing a fancy pink mask, while the other was a light built, medium sized man, with a narrow chin and across his face below the eyes, and hanging down over his chin and beard. Both apparently had flour sprinkled over their clothes by way of further disguise. The chief robber stood with his gun pointed, while the other, with an ax stove in the bottom of the treasure box as it lay in the road, going through it in a very suspicious manner. As soon as he had the coin secured he tossed the empty box back to the driver, seized his gun, and Ned was ordered to drive right along, which he did, both highwaymen stepping behind the coach and keeping their guns pointed till it was some rods away, when they dodged behind the tank and disappeared in the darkness.

A SUNDAY SCHOOL EXCURSION HAS A SQUALLY TIME.—Brother A. G. Sutherland, of Springfield, writing on the 31st ult., says that on Saturday last, 27th ult., some five hundred Sabbath school children with superintendents, teachers and about two hundred citizens, accompanied by a martial band, went on a pleasure excursion to the Utah Lake. A spacious bower was erected on the beach, some seven miles from town, at the mouth of Spanish Fork river; the excursionists arriving at about ten a.m. About one p.m. a stiff northwestern wind came down the lake, and the rowing boats were driven on shore. The sail boat owned by Messrs. Dallin and Wardsworth, which was out on the lake with a double load, was swamped at about half a mile from shore. E. Dallin and A. Harmer brought the only two young ladies that had been immersed that could not swim to shore. All hands got safe to land. A rain storm coming up, ruined our calculations and we were compelled to beat a retreat, much against the wishes of the young folks, who were only consoled with promises of another day soon. In the meantime we hope to make the Sabbath school a success and a benefit to the town.

A few days since Miss Williams received a letter from Miss Bigger informing her that the old lady died on the 10th ult., having attained to the remarkable age of 108 years. She was in the habit of passing

up and down stairs until the 5th of last July, but from that date until the day preceding her death (the 10th of August) she was able to go about, with a little assistance, from room to room, and would never give up to lie in bed in the daytime. A photograph of her that Miss Bigger sent to Miss Williams has the appearance of being that of a lady not more than about 80 years old.

but with fearful losses. Yesterday was spent in burying the dead, but this morning the French unexpectedly resumed the offensive in force, at daybreak, and have been driving the Prussians all day. The Prussians are retreating towards Carignan, and the battle is raging most fiercely at Donay, with cannonade tremendous and fighting fiercer than on Wednesday.

A cable special to the Herald, London 2, says from German official accounts of the battle at Metz, it appears that Bazaine was evidently acting in concert with McMahon. The battle lasted a day and night. Bazaine was driven back after a display of great valor. The loss of life on both sides was terrific. The 4th Landwehr fought gallantly. The first army corps was congratulated by Prince Frederick Charles on its victories.

WASHINGTON.

Hospital tax.—The marine hospital tax, of forty instead of twenty cents, took effect on the 1st inst. Collectors of customs have been instructed to collect from the crew of every vessel forty cents per month, for each and every seaman employed on any vessel since she last entered at any port of the United States.

FOREIGN NEWS.

GERMANY.

Will not Submit to Infidelity.—FULDA via LONDON 2.—The conference of Bishops has been closed, and they will reassemble on receiving the notice of the Bishop of Hefelberg. It was unanimously resolved never to submit to the action of the Ecumenical Council on the infidelity question. The faculty at Tubingen, Wurtemberg, are in accord. At the meeting of Professors at Wurtemberg, it was resolved to protest, formally, against the doctrine of absolute spiritual power and Papal infallibility.

FRANCE.

Boats captured by the French—French Successes—The French enter Germany—A Prussian Proclamation.

PARIS, 2.—The prefect of the department of Le Bas Rhine, announces to the government, that on the thirty-first of August, the sharpshooters, accompanied by a body of custom-house officers, crossed the Rhine, a few miles below Strasbourg, and captured five large boats, fastened on the Baden shore. These contained much valuable property.

The Paris journals all publish letters, from correspondents to-day, corroborating the news previously published, of the successes to our armies. The Prussians, however, are so numerous that battles must be resumed on a vast scale. Both sides have received heavy reinforcements. It is asserted that the King of Prussia is insane, and has been taken to Berlin.

It is reported that a large French army, under the command of General Donay, has entered the territory of Baden.

In Brittany, recently, seventy-two thousand persons partook of communion one day, when on the eve of enrolling themselves in the army.

It is said that the old people and the women and children of Strasbourg have been enabled to leave the city by means of a subterranean passage in an old cloister, recently discovered.

The Council of State at Paris, thinks of fixing the price of bread and provisions, owing to the rapacity of dealers. Calais and St. Pierre are to be put in a complete state of defense. Paris journals demand the dismissal of Gen. Faily, whose management of his corps betrayed great incapacity in the recent battle.

CLERMONT-EN-ARGONNE, FRANCE, Sept. 1st.—The following proclamation was published here to-day: "Every person taken by the Prussians must, in order to be regarded a prisoner of war, be actually a French soldier, attached demonstrably to an organized corps of military insignia, uniform, etc. All others taken, having arms in their possession will be tried by drum-head court martial, and if convicted, will be condemned to at least ten years hard labor in German prisons."

The Monde says that five well-trained gunners have been assigned to each of the three thousand gunners mounted on the Paris fortifications. An ample supply of ammunition has also been provided.

The journals state that the reported insanity of the King of Prussia is confirmed. It was not the army of Gen. Donay which entered Baden territory, but a large volunteer force.

The Prussian corps engaged in Thursday's battle, was the fourth, fifth, eleventh and twelfth guards, and the Bavarians, comprising a hundred and seventy-four thousand infantry, seventeen thousand cavalry and four hundred and eighty guns, nearly half of which belonged to the army of the Crown Prince of Prussia. McMahon's whole force was probably a hundred and fifty thousand, of all arms.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Warrant against Governor Holden.—RALEIGH, 2.—Hon. Josiah Turner, through counsel, yesterday, moved for a bench warrant against Governor Holden, for illegal arrest, before Judges Dick and Settle, of the Supreme Court; the motion was sustained and the argument closes to-morrow.

BELGIUM.

ANTWERP.—Three thousand six hundred cannon have been mounted for the defence of the city and the Scheldt.

BAVARIA.

Enthusiasm Among the People.—MUNICH, 2.—There is intense delight among all classes of people at the progress exhibited by the Bavarian corps in the battle of near Beaumont. Flags are flying from public buildings and elsewhere, and the citizens are parading the streets with bands of music, banners and transparencies. The Government authorities were enthusiastically cheered. Yesterday there was a reunion of the liberal deputies in the chambers to respond to the convocation of nobles in session at Berlin was duly notified,

and congratulatory telegrams were sent to King William on the field of battle, as well as to the Berlin meeting. The King, in reply, expressed joy and thanks for the confidence of the Bavarians, and assured the deputies that this combat of giants would result to the honor of Bavaria and Germany.
