WELLS, FARGO'S COACH ROBBED AGAIN. -The Gold Hill Nev. News, of last Wednesday, says at three o'clock that morning Harsh Proclamation by the one of Wells, Fargo's & Co's, coaches, en route from Reno to Virginia, was stopped by highwaymen, when five miles from the former place, and robbed of \$1,300 in coin. The News says as it, (the coach), drove up by the old water tank, two men rushed out from behind it, one of them holding up a rail across the road in front of the horses, causing them to stop, the leaders doubling back upon the wheelers, while the other man presented a shot-gnn at the driver; saying: "Pass out that treasure box, quick."
