

reach, is generally covered with cedars and pitch pine, and it is not so broken a country as that which lies west of those mountains and south-west towards the Colorado.

On the morning of the 31st of August we climbed the rugged benches, covered with the boundless forests of cedars and pines. We lost our road and traveled about three miles up a nice open canyon, across which some ranchers had built a fence without bars, and the poles were green quakenasp and as heavy as lead. While taking this fence down and then honorably putting it up again, we did not feel well towards the man who would make us so much hard work, and our consternation and mortification were complete when we discovered we were trespassing upon private premises and were obliged to go back on the same track, and do that same disagreeable work over again, when we found ourselves once more on the right road, and traveled to the first rancher's premises. We were met by Sheriff Decker and Kurnen Jones, of San Juan, who came to pilot us to the river, and I can assure you their services were needed and appreciated, for it would have been impossible for us to have found the way. They piloted us safely over the 60 miles it was from where they met us to Bluff City, over the Smith Road which was not so plain as that we traveled the day before. The road lies through the finest range for cattle that I have seen for many years; the clear ground between the forests is covered with choice green grass from six inches to one foot high. High up on the bench lands at the southeast of the Blue Mountains we drove for miles through a forest of the long leaf pine, ranging in size from six inches up to three feet in diameter. With reasonable labor and expense, a good road can be made from this timber 40 miles to the San Juan River.

We spent one day in Bluff City and held meetings with the Saints. All the canals made to take water from the river have been found to be failures when the water is low. To control the water is the big work that lies before the settlers in this section of country.

We came up here from Bluff City, 18 miles, over sandy and rough road. Here we find Wm. Hyde, of Salt Lake City, settling down and establishing a trading post, with good prospects for success. We will continue our journey to-morrow, and you must wait till I write again for more news from our party.

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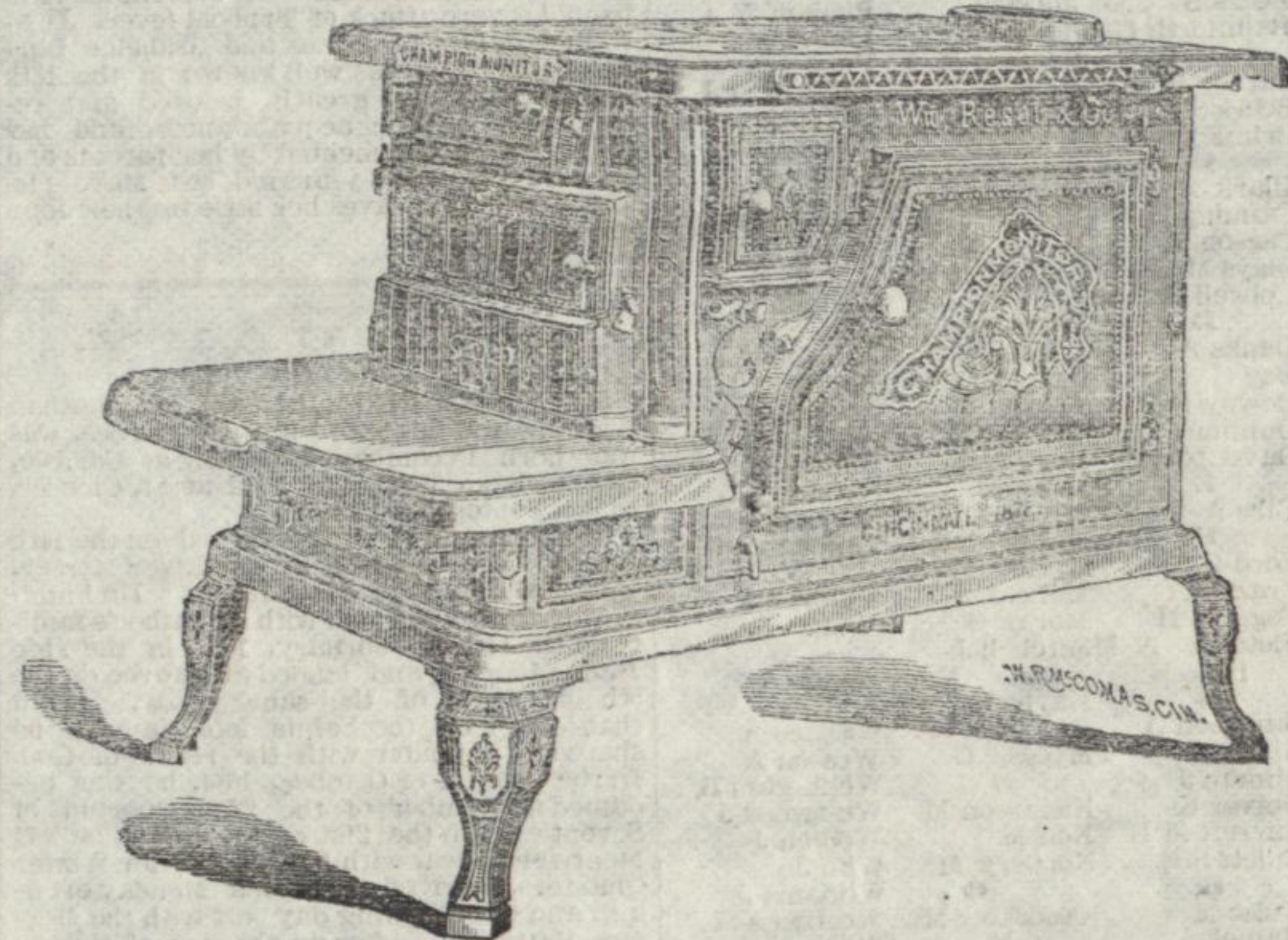
