Deseret Museum. - We were shown, to-day, a relic of the Mayflower, an old pepper-mill brought over by the Puritan Fathers by a maternal ancestor of Sister Hannah Grover, of Nephi City, Utah.

Sister Grover justly prizes this curious relic, and, in 1870, she deposited it in the Deseret Museum, by recommendation of the late President Brigham Young, at which time she refused to sell the mill. We learn now that Sister Grover has finally concluded to part with the treasure, and has wisely donated it in perpetuity to the Museum. The relic is to be restored carefully to its original shape, so as to still retain its antiquated appearance, in which condition it will be seen in the Museum cabinets among a large collection of ancient curiosities.

Ogden Matters. - The matter of the changing hands of the Ogden Iron Works property and the prospect of the manufacturing starting up again is a subject of no mean interest to that railroad center. Here is what the Junction has to say:

The thing is done. "The Ogden Iron and Coal Company of Ogden," have bought of Charles Woodmansee the property formerly owned by the Ogden Iron Manufacturing Company, and the articles of incorporation were filed in the office of the Clerk of the Probate Court on the 10th inst., with the following officers: W. G. Case, President; J. M. Langsdorf, Treasurer; Geo. F. Brown, Secretary; Directors, W. G. Case, George F. Brown, Jesse M. Langsdorf, Charles Woodmansee, John Brown, and Eric Thorsen. M. H. Beardsley; H. W. O. Margary, Attorney.

"The consideration of the deed of conveyance to this company is \$24,000, 252 shares at \$100 each have been subscribed. The capital is \$100,000, with power to increase to \$250,000, and the principal place of business is at Ogden, Utah.

"Mr. Case left for the East this morning, and expects to return in a few weeks and to work as soon as the weather will permit, so that we may now expect to see him made in Ogden by the early part of the coming summer. This will undoubtedly cut the Gordian knot which has caused so much trouble for so many years past, and with successful iron works, foundries and rolling mills in our midst, so much muscle at present unemployed will be utilized and so much money will be put out of the country will hereafter be retained here where it belongs, that we are safe in saying our best days are our future days."
